Statement by Secretary Mayorkas on President Biden's Nomination of Vice Adm. Fagan for USCG Vice Commandant

WASHINGTON – Today, Secretary of Homeland Security Alejandro N. Mayorkas released the following



statement on President Biden's nomination of Vice Adm. Linda L. Fagan to serve as Vice Commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard.

"I am pleased that President Biden has nominated Vice Admiral Linda Fagan to be the Vice Commandant of the United States Coast Guard. She is a superb leader who, as the 32nd Vice Commandant, will guide the Coast Guard at a time when its mission of securing our maritime borders, ports, and waterways has never been more important. If confirmed, Vice Admiral Fagan would serve as the first woman to be promoted to a 4-star rank in the Coast Guard. We are grateful to Vice Admiral Fagan for continuing her service to country, for the trail she has blazed, and for inspiring us all."

Vice Adm. Fagan currently serves as the commander of the Coast Guard Pacific Area, overseeing all Coast Guard missions from the Rocky Mountains to the waters off the East Coast of Africa. Fagan concurrently serves as commander, Defense Force West and provides Coast Guard mission support to the Department of Defense and Combatant Commanders. She is a 1985 graduate of the Coast Guard Academy and is the Coast Guard's first-ever Gold Ancient Trident, the officer with the longest service record in the Marine Safety field.

Pending Senate confirmation, Fagan would serve as the first woman to be promoted to a 4-star rank in the U.S. Coast Guard. She would serve as the 32nd Vice Commandant.

CALLAO, Va. — During the March 2018 Flotilla 3-10 meeting, Julian Everly announced that he would be retiring after having accumulated more than 65 consecutive years serving in the Coast Guard including Active duty, Reserves and the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Julian enlisted in the Coast Guard in September 1953 and began his career with the Auxiliary in January 1969.

When a dear friend to many, a compatriot, a fellow Coast Guard Auxiliarist, and a Coast Guard Guardian decides to retire, what can we say or write that Julian Everly, retired CG Bosun Mate Master Chief, hasn't heard or read already? Throughout the years many thanks and accolades have been extended by nonrates and others in the Coast Guard who were treated respectfully by commercial watermen who treasured Julian's sound advice how to quickly comply with the current safety regulations; by recreational boating students who always had a good take-away from Julian's lessons and were always astonished by his behind-the-back knot tying and by more than 200 fellow Auxiliarists who were mentored and

ultimately certified as Operationally Qualified. Julian evaluated candidates rigorously, fairly and examined them according to high Qualification Standards to be the next generation of Team Coast Guard Boat Operations members. It was common knowledge, If you had been QE'd by Julian, you were among the best in the Operations mission.

Julian has received the thanks of many during his lifetime commitment to TEAM Coast Guard. These have been and will continue to be in the form of personal wishes. But he has also been the recipient of 85 Auxiliary awards alone that recognize his lasting contributions to the Auxiliary as part of TEAM Coast Guard. Throughout his Auxiliary career, Julian served selflessly within elected and appointed leadership positions. He has contributed to virtually every mission area of the Auxiliary. With exceptional leadership and commitment to excellence he raised the bar of professionalism through outstanding skills in training and mentoring of his shipmates. Julian was also instrumental in developing the initial Auxiliary Boat Crew Training Program and in training National Auxiliary Officers in its methodology. Among the first Qualification Examiners in the 5th Southern, he personally mentored and trained three Auxiliary National Commodores, as well as numerous district, division and flotilla officers and members.

During this entire time, Jean, his wife, served by his side and "had his back" – and still does. A Tribute to her in itself! For 32 years Jean Everly served in the

Coast Guard Auxiliary dedicating her time to the promotion of recreational boating safety. A very special "TEAM" within Team Coast Guard. Wishing them the traditional "Fair Winds and Calm Seas", along with our hopes for a healthy

retirement.

COLONIAL BEACH, Va.— Sal Puglisi has been a resident of Colonial Beach, Virginia for the past 20 years and a member of Flotilla 3-10 since 2010. Sal's 90th Birthday was on 31 January 2021, and despite his advanced middle age, he continues to be a skilled and productive member within the Auxiliary RBS Vessel Examination and Program Visitor missions.

Colonial Beach is a boating community with vessels on trailers, in slips and in storage racks. Sal reaches out to them all with his specially-equipped buggy golf cart that is tricked out with special wheels and tires, an above-average horsepower motor, that pushes it along at 22 mph and a drop-down canvas to protect him when the weather doesn't cooperate.

Sal's buggy is a Vessel Safe-ty Check Station on wheels. He just loves serving his community as well as the Coast Guard Auxiliary.

In the past five years Sal has completed 870 VSCs within the community and in 2020 alone completed 170 VSCs, leading Division 3 Vessel Examiners. In addition, he performed 203 Program Visits to local Marine businesses, also the highest number in the Division.

Colonial Beach's proclamation notes that Sal "has gained the admiration and respect from all walks of life throughout the community", and I think safe to add, also from the Coast Guard and the Auxiliary.

CAPT Samson Stevens, Commander, Sector Virginia (center) and his staff, made a short video "Happy Birthday Sal" which conveyed thanks for all his service to the Coast Guard and the Auxiliary. They sent it to him on his 90th Birthday, with a follow-up phone call from CAPT Stevens.

The versatility of the Famous-class cutter makes it a cost-effective platform in carrying out national homeland security objectives.

The change-of-command ceremony is a historic military tradition representing the formal transfer of authority and responsibility for a unit from one commanding officer to another. The event reinforces the continuity of command and provides an opportunity to recognize the crew's accomplishments.
