

"HONOR FLIGHT" SELECTS TWO OF OUR MEMBERS

B ack in May, Alvin Lynn made a presentation to the Flotilla about *Honor Flight*. It is an organization that honors Veterans for their military service. It is aimed at WW II and Korean Vets but because of the decline in their numbers it has been expanded to Viet Nam vets as well. That is how I qualified.

I took the information from Alvin, sent it off and received an application to attend. I was embarrassed to have never heard of Honor Flight but nothing ventured nothing gained. To my surprise I was invited to participate on October 7. It was a day I will remember forever.

We met at the VFW in Mechanicsville at 0630 where we received our Green Wind Breakers identifying us as the Honored Vets. There was a large crowd that included the Boy Scouts who gave each Vet an American flag, a handshake and a warm thank you. We were assigned Guardians who escorted each of us all day. We started the day with the presenting of the flags by the VFW, the Pledge, a few speeches and breakfast. Then we boarded the buses and started down the road. I was shocked to see people lining the road waving, saluting, applauding and waving flags. A police escort and a parade and we were just starting.

Our first stop was the US Marine Corps Museum where we met up with two buses from Williamsburg. Aboard one of those was Phil Landry who also took the lead from Alvin, applied and was accepted. We were met outside by kids, adults, service members in uniform and others who shook our hands, said thank you and acknowledged our military service.

We next boarded the buses to go to the USAF Memorial and we had another police escort. As usual 95 was bumper to bumper but the Virginia State Trooper parted the cars for us. We had box lunches at the AF Memorial and then we went to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier for the changing of the guard. I am sure most have seen it but regardless of the number of times I find it always moving. Next we went to the WW II Memorial and then to the Korean and Viet Nam Memorials. Each Vet in attendance had their own memories and/or moving moment I am sure. I found the name of a high school classmate killed in Viet Nam, I think the only person I know on the wall. I thanked him for his sacrifice.





BOB WARING ECLIPSES 45 YEARS OF AUXILIARY MEMBERSHIP

O n the 14th of October Bob Waring turned 90 and celebrated with friends and family at Bob and "Mickey's" river home on the Lower Machodoc. It was a fitting setting considering Bob's love of the water he has patrolled as a longtime member of the Coast Guard Auxiliary – 45 years long or half of a lifetime.

Bob's Auxiliary membership started on the 20th of October 1972. He retired in 2012 after 40 years of dedicated and highly active service. During his very active involvement in the Auxiliary, Bob became Division Captain (long before it was called DCDR) of Division 14 (now Division 25); in that capacity, he presided at the chartering of Flotilla 25-11 when it was formed in Colonial Beach. On that occasion he was on patrol and switched out of his operational

uniform and donned a dress uniform to conduct the formal chartering ceremony. Then back to work on the boat–probably called "Rusty Nail".

Bob received numerous awards throughout his Auxiliary career. He was instrumental in the formation of "Cruise Crews", an initiative in Flotilla 3-10 to promote recreational cruises of members and spouses throughout area waters (sometimes beyond, like to Washington, DC).

When asked if one of his awards was more important than another, Bob said he was always proud to be rewarded for his personal achievements, perhaps especially being elected or appointed to several responsible levels of Auxiliary leadership". Of the many other awards, Bob said, "they were nice too".
