If you want to be a Vessel Inspector, Pat Fields will tell you about the on line course and work with you. When you get an email from Sector North Carolina, or other sectors, or one from District, take the time to read it and see if anything interests you. Wayne Earley's mantra is accurate, "any course you take will be worthwhile." When you go to a training event, you will find it to be a lot like our meetings, everyone is friendly and interested in supporting you. Despite the fact that the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary attracts type "A" competitive people, the "team" culture we prize channels all that power towards a great organization. It's exciting to be together with teammates.

Oyster Shells and USCGAUX

Our Marine Safety Flotilla Staff Officer, Bill Trimyer, hasn't met an oyster he didn't like. He looks at those gnarled, grooved, and calcified shells with thoughts of gustatory delight. He also knows where they come from and wants to make sure the good people of the Outer Banks can continue to enjoy this bivalve delight. Oysters grow on other oysters. If we harvest an oyster, we need to return the shell to where it can contribute to oyster habitat. Something we use to do quite significantly in the Outer Banks, but the numbers have decreased



dramatically since the tax credit for recycling nature's oyster packaging expired in 2014. Here is Bill's answer to this problem from his staff report.



Bill has met with Curtis Weychert, Oyster Sanctuary Biologist and Greg Allen, both of whom are with the North Carolina Division of Marine Fisheries. Mr. Weychert sent him a ten minute film on oyster shell recycling for healthy waters which he hopes to present to our general meeting in November. The oyster recycling for the Outer Banks has been significantly reduced due to lack of financial incentive. The good news is

that there is still a repository for shells in Wanchese. Kill Devil Hills Recycling has collection barrels for individuals and restaurants to recycle their shells.

With a list of restaurants that Mr. Allen gave him to contact and encourage the recycling of Oyster shells, Bill has been on a mission starting with Mr. Kelly at Kelly's Restaurant. Mr. Kelly was not aware of the KDH collection of shells for recycling. He indicated he would have his employees take shells to that location.

Bill encourages all of us, "Should you attend an oyster roast in the future you can ask what will be done with the oyster shells. Let the organizers know they can be taken to the KDH Recycling Center." He further states, "I am also available to bring collection barrels and will take them to the KDH Recycling Center." That is an officer willing to go the extra mile!
