Battle of St. Leonard Creek reenacted

Jefferson Patterson Park and Museum (JPPM) hosted its annual War of 1812 Fair and Reenactment on 21 and 22 Jun. This fair is typically a one day event held in September but this year it was changed to a two day event and moved to June to celebrate the bicentennial anniversary of the Battle of St. Leonard Creek.

During the War of 1812, dramatic events took place on JPPM grounds. The British had controlled the Chesapeake Bay since the beginning of the war. In an attempt to open the Bay, a flamboyant ex-privateer, Commodore Joshua Barney, assembled a rag-tag fleet of eighteen small gun boats, barges, and sloops and headed down the Bay in June of 1814. Barney's Chesapeake Flotilla clashed with the British on June 8 – 10 and again on June 26th in the Battle of St. Leonard Creek. The battle, which is the largest naval engagement in the history of Maryland, took place where the Patuxent River meets the mouth of St. Leonard Creek, right off the shore of JPPM.

The naval engagement was supported on land by American Army, Marine, and militia units, including a gun battery which was located on JPPM property. Both the land units and the flotilla engaged the British, and hundreds of shots per hour were exchanged between the two forces. Archaeological evidence of the battle has been discovered on JPPM grounds in the form of cannonballs, musket shot and other military artifacts. Eventually the British retreated and Barney's fleet was able to escape from St. Leonard Creek.

On 22 Jun Auxiliary facilities were assigned escort duty for the Tall Ships that traveled between Calvert Marine Museum and JPPM for the battle reenactment. The reenactment was planned for the vicinity of St Leonard's Creek just off the Patuxent River. The Tall Ships were Kalmar Nychel of Delaware, and Maryland ships Pride of Baltimore, Sultana and the Maryland Dove.

Auxiliary facilities involved with escort duty were Fish Hook, Robin Marie and Liz Reece.

Ray Feller, Flotilla Commander, 23-6 complemented Willie on a job well done saying "Great job. Many helped, but you're the one most responsible for making this happen. Confronted by an opportunity, you made the most of it and pulled it together."

Also, appreciation came through a hearty thank you from Thomas Costello, Fleet Captain, HYBC. In a note to Willie Witters, Costello said "On behalf of the Herring Bay Yacht Club and the Herrington Harbour Marina's, I want to extend my personal thanks for the incredible effort applied by your entire team over this past weekend's Vessel Safety Check program. . . County Commissioners proclaim National Safe Boating Week

On 6 May, Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 23-6 received a proclamation from the Board of County Commissioners proclaiming 17-23 May as National Safe Boating Week.

Ray Feller, Flotilla Commander 23-6, addressed the Commissioners and the audience saying "The Auxiliary is dedicated to boating safety. We participate in public education, vessel safety checks, safety patrols, and search and rescue. Our next boating class is scheduled for 19 May." Ray told the audience that 23 June is the 75th anniversary of the Coast Guard Auxiliary.

In the proclamation the Commissioners highlighted the statistic of an average of 700 people die each year in boating-related accidents in the US. The vast majority of accidents are caused by human error or poor judgment, not by the boat, equipment or environmental factors. A significant number of boaters who lose their lives by drowning each year would be alive today had they worn a life jacket. Modern life jackets are more comfortable, attractive, and wearable than styles of years past and deserve a fresh look by today's boating public.

The Commissioners further "proclaimed that all who use our County waterways and our National waterways are urged to acquire the knowledge and skills essential to their own safety and the safety of others and to apply these skills carefully. Boat Smart, Boat Safe, Wear It"

Similarly in 2012, Auxiliary commitment following Super Storm SANDY and Hurricane IRENE was instrumental to effective Coast Guard response and recovery operations. The Auxiliary consistently found innovative ways to support the Coast Guard, including establishment of the Auxiliary Food Services program which trained Auxiliarists to augment Coast Guard galleys, afloat and ashore. Auxiliarists involved with Public Affairs, Interpreter Corps, America's Waterway Watch, and many other programs further contributed to Coast Guard success volunteering their professional talents, mastery of trade, and disciplined initiative wherever and whenever needed. The Auxiliary's unwavering efforts directly contributed to unprecedented national boating safety achievements, highlighted in 2013 with the fewest boating fatalities in 50 years. Despite incredible challenges amid keen competition for America's volunteers, the Auxiliary grew its membership, provided over 22 million hours of inspirational support to the Coast Guard, and kept our Nation's coasts, lakes, and waterways safe and secure. The professionalism, pride, and devotion to duty displayed by the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Coast Guard."


