#### West chosen 23-6 Auxiliarist of the Year

Recrea onal Boa g
Safety Program (RBS) to

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ensure the public has a safe, secure recrea experience on our waterways. RT reinforces the training, outreach promo onal programs to limit personal injury, loss of life and property damage associated with accidents, and accentuate the recrea oater educa onal awareness.

He administers RBS classes throughout Calvert County, proctoring classes with the support of fellow instructors, mentoring boaters in the fundamentals safety and of challenges, during the year. Guiding mariners through oat plans, universal distress signals, logis of naviga proper wear of Personal Flota Device (PFD), iden of the parts of the boat and how to survive the elements in an accident on the water un help arrives.

He supports Public airs events in the State of Maryland and Calvert County such as PRAD, Na Night Out, and Na Safe Boa g Week proclama on ceremony by County Commissioners . He prepares and sets up Flo la displays in the Calvert County Library, etc. The common thread in the majority of his e orts is to spread the word of boa g responsibly. His interest is to support the outreach missions and con ually build a founda of learning for the boa g public.

During 2018, the o la was requested to be one of the p cipants in the Summer Safety Standdown. The stand-down was scheduled for a e duty military personnel at two di erent venues, Joint Base Andrews and Patuxent Naval Sta on with the focus on boa g safety management, safety equipment and opera g under the in uence. The goal was to reinforce the points of

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safety and present the USCG Auxiliary educa onal program within the allo ed criteria set by the military safety program.

Auxiliarist West led the program to include rela g to the following topics:

- 1. Goals to reduce mortality/accidents by poin g out solu to encourage responsible boa g.
- 2. Accident preven by wearing proper safety equipment (Don a life jacket).
- 3. Take a boater safety course and follow the rules of the road.
- 4. Have a vessel safety in for equipment check and proper equipment fun n.
- 5. Risk management, boa g responsibly and not opera g under the in uence.
- 6. Contributory factors of incidents are operator inexperience, improper lookout and a en eness.

He navigated the outline as well as a mariner on the sea. Poin g out situa occurrences commonly referred to in Team Coordinated Training, excessive speed, wake res ons, operator errors/inexperience, overloading of vessels, sharp sudden/turns, etc. Other factors such as fa ue, weather or health issues.

He was the main liaison for the mission, the primary point of contact, scouted and surveyed the presenta on area, and help build an e ve presenta on.

His emphasis was direct but clear, polished but concise. He challenged the crews to review and follow Maryland guidelines for safe boa g, m gate their risk but understand circumstances to prevent accidents and their causes.

I am honored to present to Auxiliarist West the Flo la 23-6 <u>2018 Auxiliarist of the Year</u> award for his fo tude and responsiveness to be a complimentary educa onal resource for the Flo la and the Auxiliary.



**Opera ns:** Auxiliarists oper ng boats, aircra, radios, etc.

**Public Educa n:** Auxiliarists providing ins on to the public.

**Vessel Safety Checks:** Members performing VE's. **Team Coast Guard Events:** Auxiliarists assis g or inter g with ve CG or Reservists in any approved mission except law enforcement.

The photography contest will be judged on the following criteria: cap ons must conform to Associated Press Style (Dateline/cap on) criteria. Consult Coast Guard External airs Manual, 2014 Ed on, and study photos with correct datelines. Photos of anyone under the age of 18 (if recognizable) must be accompanied by a signed

# USS TAMPA PURPLE HEART MEDAL CAMPAIGN

The U.S. Coast Guard needs your help with loca ng and cont g descendants of the USS TAMPA, which was tragically sunk during World War I with all hands lost. The Service has yet to present 84 of the outstanding Purple Heart Medals awarded posthumously to the crew. We intend to recognize as many of the descendants as possible this Memorial Day. We need your help to do this.

#### Background:

A. USS TAMPA, a Coast Guard ship and crew serving under the Department of the Navy, was lost with all hands a er being torpedoed by a German U-boat o Wales on 26 September 1918. This tragic loss occurred just weeks before the end of World War I. It was the single largest loss ered by the Coast Guard during that con ict.

B. At the of TAMPA's loss, the Purple Heart Medal was not in use. In 1942, eligibility was extended to include the Coast Guard, but it was not un 1952 that the awarding of the Purple Heart Medal was made retroac e for ns a er 5 April 1917. However, TAMPA was overlooked un 1999, when a r ed Coast Guardsman subm ed a proposal to award the Purple Heart to her crew.

C. In 1999, then-Commandant Admiral James Loy authorized the posthumous awarding of the Purple Heart Medal to the crew of USS TAMPA. Today, over one hundred years a er TAMPA was lost and twenty years a er the rst TAMPA Purple Heart was awarded, the Coast Guard is s la emp g to iden y those families who have yet to receive their ancestors' Purple Heart.

The purpose of this ALCOAST is to raise awareness of the Purple Heart award program and to conue to iden y those families who have yet to receive their ancestors' medals. You can help.

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# Summary of USS TAMPA Purple Heart Medals awarded:

- A. There were 130 men on TAMPA, including 111 Coast Guardsmen and 4 Navy men.
- B. 26 TAMPA Purple Heart Medals have been claimed since 1999.
- C. 3 TAMPA Purple Heart Medals are presently in progress.
- D. 84 TAMPA Purple Heart Medals remain unclaimed.

The names of the 84 TAMPA crew whose Purple Heart Medals remain unclaimed are listed here: h ps://www.history.uscg.mil/tampa/.

To submit applica for TAMPA Purple Heart Medals, please contact Ms. Nora Chidlow, Coast Guard Archivist, at Nora.L.Chidlow@uscg.mil or 202-559-5142. She has served as the primary point of contact between the Coast Guard and many TAMPA descendants, and also with the Medals & Awards branch.

To apply for their ancestor's Purple Heart Medal, descendants are required to provide documentashowing the descendant's rela ip to the TAMPA crew member, such as family trees, pages from family Bibles, birth/death cates, and/or pages from Ancestry or other genealogical applica-Please expect about 4-6 weeks' e for processing.

I encourage all members of our Coast Guard family to share this ALCOAST with the widest possible audience. We owe it to our shipmates in USS TAMPA and their descendants to ensure their heroism and e are recognized and remembered.

#### Sector MNCR Challenge Coin Rec

Auxiliarists Christopher Jensen dis guished himself while serving as Division Sta Program Visitor. On 17 May 2018 the District Captain requested immediate assistance distribute an Emergency No ce to Mariners regarding severe shoaling that required temporary emergency changes to the aids to naviga Patrick Creek and St. George Creek West Channel, both o of the Potomac River. Auxiliarist Jensen quickly reproduced the No to Mariners and personally distributed to 15 local marinas and marine suppliers ensuring that this document was distributed expedi v to local waterway users.

In July 2018, to meet a Division In a e to stave the increased number of drownings in the D5SR AORs, Auxiliarist Jensen reproduced and distributed Spanish Language Life Jacket Pamphlets to 16 marine suppliers and Spanish outlets to get the widest distribu on of this important message in a ly manner.

On 26 August 2018 The Coast Guard again requested assistance with g ng no a on to the public for changes that were needed to Slaughter Creek in r n to shoaling cond ons. Over the following e days Auxiliarist Jensen reproduced the No e to Mariners and distributed it to 26 local marinas and suppliers.

On 30 September 2018 the Coast Guard requested assistance in no ying the public about proposing to discon ue the light signal for Sandy Point Shoal Light. Over the following two days Auxiliarists JENSEN no 29 local Marinas and Suppliers.

Auxiliarists JENSEN's devo to duty is deeply appreciated by the Sector MNCR command as well as the Fi h Coast Guard District's Waterways Management Branch. Through his e orts we have been able to keep mariners informed of planned projects and b er provide them the opportunity to comment prior to project naliza

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#### Ospreys on the Bay

The familiar sight of ospreys soaring over the Chesapeake Bay and its rivers and creeks is a sure sign that spring has arrived. Feeding mainly on sh, these migratory birds are highly adaptable and can be found on every con ent in the world a. Here on the bay, their story has except Antar not always been a successful one. About forty years ago, their popula on had dropped to a mere 1,450 nes g pairs along the Chesapeake primarily because of the use of DDT, a toxic chemical which was nally banned in 1972 by Congress. Up un then it was used by farmers who sprayed it on their crops to keep the bug popula down. The chemical found its way into the surrounding waters and destroyed a number of aqua and bird species.

Ospreys are referred to as sea hawks, river hawks or sh hawks and are a *site delic* species meaning that once they nd a place that they like, they will return to it year a er year. To give themselves a prot e 360 degree view, they typically make their nests on naviga nal markers which is considered a nuisance primarily because of the size of the nest and its ability to obscure lights and signs. However, wildlife officials have found that by providing cial pla orms, more ospreys could be accommodated with less of an impact to naviga on.

Ospreys are also considered an indicator species. Exis g on a seafood diet, problems arising from issues with the local marine environment show up in the health of the local bird popula rather quickly and can serve as a warning device as to the health of the Bay. Unfortunately, an increasing number of them are being strangled and ocated by the plas debris that people toss into the water.

Ospreys have nest predators like raccoons and snakes which are a racted to their eggs. Aerial predators such as owls and eagles are also a constant threat to their environment.

Despite the fact that ospreys can be overly aggressive, especially if you approach their nest, they are protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act and their nests can only be removed if uninhabited.



Bal ore Gas and Electric has even adopted a new program called Osprey Watch for the purposes of customers no ying the company of osprey nests on u ity poles. If you spot such a cond on, no y BGE at OspreyWatch.com and provide them with the pole number located on a placard near eye level on the pole. If the pole is not accessible, take photos and send them instead along with a loca BGE will remove the nest if no birds or eggs are present or will place a deterrent to shield the birds and nests if it is inhabited.

Ospreys will con ue to be a common site on the Bay and we will all both just have to learn to live together.
