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JO's JOURNAL From Jo Opisso, Flotilla Commander

I had the opportunity to teach at the recent Boating Safety class. The ABS class is a very important service. Matter of fact, it may be the most important thing we do that reaches the general public next to proper vessel safety checks. New to boating and self-proclaimed experienced boaters take this class.

Unfortunately, Florida does not require any boat handling training or knowledge to operate a vessel. Should we wonder why there are so many accidents with fatalities and injuries? It is amazing that there aren't more. Imagine if markers were placed in the bodies of water where deaths have occurred like those you see on roadways. I suspect they would be in the hundreds and certain bodies of water would have more than others, right?

Based on the most recent boating accident statistics (2011) from the Florida Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) law enforcement division, ten counties have the most boating accidents. Fifty- nine percent of accidents occurring in Florida happened in ten counties. I list them here from number one to number ten: Monroe (93, 5 fatal), Miami-Dade (75, 3 fatal), Palm Beach (58, 2 fatal),

Broward (41, 5 fatal), Lee (38, 1 fatal), Pinellas (36,3 fatal), Collier (34, 3 fatal), Brevard (25,3 fatal), Hillsbourgh (20, 6 fatal), Martin (20, 1 fatal).

The causes of these accidents ranged from collisions with a fixed object, running aground or the operator or passengers falling overboard.

Our mission is Recreational Boating Safety. We need to stand ready to fulfill this mission through our training, study, and devotion to duty.



In case you think it can't happen to you...

Every month I listen carefully to the news looking for boating accidents that you just don't think could happen to you. Often common sense prevails, such as had they not been drinking, going too fast after dark without lights or not letting someone know where you are going and when you will be back.

This month as I was considering which accident was "newsworthy." Sadly I have to report about an accident I could not have imagined.

I found this on the CBS/Miami webpage. A young woman was sitting in a boat on the Caloosahatchee River when a tube in the boat flew out. Unfortunately, there was a line attached to the tube. And the line wrapped around her neck and pulled her into the river. She did not survive.

I have a friend who lost his thumb in a person watercraft accident when the vessel suddenly accelerated and the kite he was preparing launched and the line severed his thumb.

Who hasn't seen an old black and white movie reel where the boat takes off and the comic foil is standing on a line on the dock and is pulled behind the boat. In this case, he lands on his feet and barefoots to safety. Imagine if a small child is playing and someone lets out the anchor line just as the little one reaches for a toy entangled in said line.

Who hasn't been behind a trailered boat stuffed with toys and had something fly out on the interstate?

Safety is up to you!

If you are out tubing and are loading up to get underway, please untie the tube/floaty before taking off. Secure them in your vehicle before hitting the road. And stow those lines when not in use.

Better to say, it will be a few minutes while we make things secure than I'm so sorry for your loss...
