FLOTILLA COMMANDER REPORTS

FC REPORT 15-1, Crystal River

Flotilla 15-1 remains a very active unit in the second quarter of 2012. This quarter, we were notified that our staff officer for Human Resources is eligible for the NACO Membership Growth Award.

We continue to provide 3 Watchstanders for Station Yankeetown three days a week. During the month of April, Flotilla 15-1 held a hot dog/hamburger barbeque at Station Yankeetown for their staff members. All food items were brought by the members of our flotilla – from potato salad to carrot cake.

On Memorial Day, our patrol held a cook-out for lunch at our Radio Room and invited patrol members from Station Yankeetown to join us. There were 7 USCG present.

Operations:

Patrols for the second quarter have been consistent. A patrol was completed on Memorial Day. During the second quarter, we have had several on-the-water joint-training patrols with Station Yankeetown. At present, we have three crew trainees and two coxswain trainees.

We continue to foster inter-flotilla cooperation with flotilla 15-4. Several members of their unit were crew members on our patrols in April and May. June's schedule has at least one 15-4 member on each of our patrols.

Member Training

Within our Flotilla we continue to hold monthly training sessions. Operations personnel must complete a review quiz on different topics related to their responsibilities as crew/coxswain. In preparation for Hurricane Season, we reviewed the procedure for the Calling Tree. After the Calling Tree took place, we reviewed the procedure and discussed ways to improve our responses.

Public Affairs

We have been more successful lately obtaining coverage in the newspaper. In addition, the Sheriff's department helped by promoting National Safe Boating Week with the use of their electronic sign on the roadway saying "Life Jackets Float-You Won't- Boat Safely". Pictures of our Safe Boating classes and the coloring contest for "Ready , Set, Wear-It" have appeared in the Chronicle.

Our new in-house newsletter is thriving thanks to member Jodi Love. Our members are enjoying receiving the e-newsletter which has articles and pictures of events, as well as a new feature called "meet the member".

Recreational Safe Boating and Public Education Vessel Safety Check events were held in April, May, and June. During National Safe Boating Week, we held multiple Vessel Safety Checks. For the entire week, we had Vessel Examiners available at West Marine to check boats for customers, as requested. Another VSC during that week was held at a Twin Rivers Marina, and another at a local bait/tackle shop. An article was submitted to the Chronicle about the importance of getting a safety check done on your vessel.

On several different dates, we staffed our Boating Safety Information tent at the Vessel Safety Check events at Ft. Island Trail Marine Supply and Bait Shops, Twin Rivers Marina, West Marine (inside table set up), at our Flotilla Radio Room boat dock, and at the Crystal River

Preserve State Park Boat Bash.

In April we graduated 10 people from our Boating Skills and Seamanship class, and three others who didn't complete the class will be continuing with the class in September. During National Safe Boating Week, we held an About Boating Safely class and graduated nine people ranging in age from 13-66.

Operations

We are making good progress in getting required underway hours completed. Four coxswains have completed more than the 12 hour requirement while three need a few more hours. Total underway hours for all coxswains for 2012 is 101.9. Of our 15 boat crew members, one has more than 12 hours. All others are still in process. The total underway hours for crew is 96.1. Most of these hours were served onboard facilities, other than our own, belonging to 15-01, 15-08 and with Larry Berman. We are very grateful for their assistance.

Other annual requirements to be completed are for TCT. We have 2 coxswains needing to complete 1hr TCT and 4 boat crew members who need to take the 8hr TCT instruction. There are two TCT classes scheduled during the remainder of this year, one on 8 July and the second on 13 October. Both classes will be at the 15-01 facility in Crystal River. Individuals needing this instruction are, Elaine Miranda, Al McNamara, Dee Imhoff and Bobby Ward.

As we have previously reported, there are requalification due this year for four coxswains and 1 boat crew member. David Claspell, once his facility is certified, will be seeking coxswain certification, as well. We will have a great deal of training to work through in the latter part of the summer to complete the process. We also are close to having another facility inspected for certification and this should alleviate some of the training issues.

All crew members should be aware that when going out with other flotillas that the patrol start time will probably be different from what 15-04 is. In fact, the patrols being scheduled at 15-04 have been getting underway at 0900.

Information Systems

At our June Flotilla meeting we reviewed the flotilla website. From an Information Services standpoint, I hope there was sufficient emphasis on reporting mechanisms that everyone is more

comfortable with acquiring and using the various forms for recording activities. And very important is the use of form 7028, "Change of Member Information". It is your tool for keeping the auxiliary up-to-date on your contact information. It is available at the PDF file for forms and must be submitted manually with your signature. Please use it every time you change your address, phone and email.

Program Visitor

Georgia Young and Anna Hughes visited our partners on June 3rd. They distributed materials . USCG ANSC 7046 forms have been completed and submitted. A case of FL Boaters Guides was ordered from Bill Griswald at FWC. Georgia will be out of the area until September. We continue to encourage more participation from our members.

1) Operations have been picking up, but we still are getting a few weather related cancellations. If you do decide to cancel please try and remain on B-1 Status. I send the schedule to the Station in advance and they may have planned their operations based on them knowing we are covering a particular area. I send them the information on Thursday or Friday so the Officer of the Day has only that data to rely on. If you do cancel please notify the station directly of your intent and your readiness status. Just so you will know what the Bravo Status is:

- B-0 means can be underway immediately.
- B-1 means can be underway in under an hour.
- B-2 means can be underway in 1 to 2 hours.

2) Some members are again beginning to take advantage of Station Yankeetown's ride along program. Auxiliarists can go out on a CG vessel on their training day - preferably the second or fourth Thursday of each month. Contact me to participate.

3) Doing 2 boat drills with a station boat and an AUXFAC is a good learning experience as well. If the CG doesn't come to your area consider bringing a facility to their training area, usually Yankeetown or Crystal River.

4) Hurricane conditions -- the pre season drill went well, but remember we are in Condition 4 from June 1 to Nov 30 so be prepared. Have your "Grab and Go kit at the ready, vessel fueled up and keep your vehicle at ½ tank or better. Keep others informed if you are leaving the area so we don't waste time looking for you.

1. Was appointed to the SO-PV staff officer position effective June 5, 2012. I expect I will receive the SO-PV records at the Division meeting on July 7. I Sent an email to all FSO-PVs in the Division, asking for their April, May and June reports. Six flotillas have sent in reports, and one flotilla did not respond to several emails requesting reports. Several flotillas are in the process of qualifying new Program Visitors. Supply issues with ANSC continue to concern PVs regarding their dwindling supply of brochures and pamphlets.

Program Visitors followed up with visits to partners during NSBW to make sure the flyers were posted and encouraged the partners to promote the course with their customers. On May 19, members participated in NSBW activities at

the Ocala Boat Basin, providing Vessel Safety Checks, boating safety talks and a PA booth. Marlinspike lessons were provided, as well (see attached photos).

-15-4, Homosassa, reported cleaning their building and organizing materials, clothing, PFD's and readying materials and supplies for NSBW kickoff on May 19. Florida Boater's Guides were ordered through Bill Griswold from the Fish and Wildlife Commission.

-15-5, Gainesville—no report received.

-15-7. Suwannee River, nothing to report

-15-8, Hernando Beach, reported they held an Open House and participated in the ribbon cutting

ceremony on May 20 as part of NSBW to acknowledge the completion of the Hernando County Dredge Project. They provided a Color Guard for the opening ceremonies and representatives from the US Coast Guard attended.

3. I encourage all Vessel Examiners to become cross-qualified as Program Visitors.

4. I encourage PVs to suggest partners who should receive a Certificate of Appreciation, and to notify their Public Affairs staff officers to publish an article about these 'star' partners to call attention to both the partner and the Auxiliary.

Misfortune on Withlacoochee Bay

On Thursday, June 14, 2012, Jeff Barry of Yankeetown Flotilla 15-2 and I were out on a U.S. Coast Guard training patrol with BM2 Danny Hart and MK1 Joe Majewski, USCG. We were using two boats, a 20' and a 27'. I rode in the 20-footer. Just before departing, we received an emergency distress call from a 62-foot shrimp boat taking on water out in Withlacoochee Bay in the vicinity of green marker 17, about 2-3 miles out of the Withlacoochee River, on the west coast of Florida. They scrambled the 27' and went after it. We were sent out as a follow-up so the 27 footer could take the fishermen on board to shore. The shrimpers had beached the boat on a shoal so it wouldn't sink and it was listing to starboard about 45 degrees. When we arrived, the fishermen were being taken ashore and we stayed to survey the situation. After we made sure the vessel was securely beached on the shoal and would not move, we noticed a gasoline smell and saw the sheen of it on the water. We reported this to Coast Guard Station Yankeetown and we asked if we should place an oil boom around the vessel. They agreed, so we returned to the dock to get 5 lengths of boom, each about 40 feet long. We tied the boom to the stern of our boat to tow it to the scene, since it was too heavy to carry in the boat. On the way back out, one of the links broke, so the 27-footer retrieved it and followed us out with the remaining boom. At the scene, they came alongside our boat and we retrieved it and linked it to the remaining boom segments and proceeded to ring the boom around the beached vessel. It was shoaled about 50 yards out of the marked channel, so it was not a hazard to navigation. When the scene had been secured, we headed back to port. What started out to be a routine patrol, turned out to be an exciting day for us.
