Division 8 Change of Watch

The Division 8 Change of Watch (COW) will be held at Kenlake State Park Resort and Lodge on January 22, 2022 at 1200 in the Dining area of Kenlake Lodge. The State park area is south of Aurora, KY, with the entrance to the Park and lodge being immediately west of the Junction of US route 68 and KY route 80. [Proceeding from Aurora you will be traveling in a southerly direction on US route 68, at the junction of KY route 80 you will turn right in a westerly direction, you will turn left to enter the Park area and Lodge]. A room rate of \$75.00 is available to the Auxiliary. The meal consisting of; Salad Bar, Smothered Chicken or Pork Loin with 3 sides, Dessert and Ice Tea or water is available at a cost of \$25.00 per person.

History Corner

The birthday of the Coast Guard Auxiliary is traced back to when the Coast Guard Reserve was authorized by act of congress on June 23, 1939 and June 23 is considered the Birthday of the Coast Guard Auxiliary to this day because of the composition of The Coast Guard Reserve at the time. The Coast Guard Reserve of 1939 was a non-military service comprised of unpaid volunteer U.S. citizens who owned motorboats and yachts. Less than two years later on February 19, 1941 congress amended the above mentioned action with the passage of the Auxiliary and Reserve Act of 1941. This action formally established The Coast Guard Reserve as a military part of the Coast Guard and the former Coast Guard Reserve comprised of unpaid civilian volunteers became the present day Coast Guard Auxiliary.

The current day Coast Guard has been referred to in the past by several names; Revenue Marine, Revenue Cutter Service, etc., however called, the Coast Guard has a history of using volunteers even prior to 1939. In 1848 congress appropriated \$10,000.00 for the purchase of surf boats, rockets, carronades and other apparatus for the better preservation of life and property from shipwrecks along the coast of New Jersey. Structures were constructed in several likely spots along the coast that seemed appropriate and the equipment was placed in each location. While the funds were provided for the sites and equipment, no funding was established for employing people to man or use the sites. The remedy to this situation was to pick an individual with a trustworthy appearance from the local population. This investment did not have to wait long to prove its importance. When the British bark Ayrshire ran aground in a severe winter storm in January 1850. All but one of the 166 passengers and crew of 36 were saved by station volunteers using a metal Francis Life-Car from the local station; the seas being too rough to use the surf boat or other equipment. The roots of volunteerism are firmly established over the history of the United States Coast Guard.
