Flotilla 11-04 8ER Welcomes Ramon-Antonio Jiminez





Greetings! I'm Hernan Flores, and I recently joined the USCG Auxiliary Division 8ER, Flotilla 11-04 in Nashville, Tennessee. This bio is written so you can get acquainted with my background, (in reality, it is written because Ramon the FSO-PB asked me to... but I digress).

I was born and raised in San Juan, Puerto Rico, and attended Catholic and lay private schools during my youth. Growing up, my hobbies and extracurricular activities included debate (Model United Nations) basketball, Junior Achievement, baseball, biking, chess, scouting, bowling, playing pool, going to the beach (that I could take for granted then), and sightseeing all over Puerto Rico.
