She stated as with many governmental agencies, their people are stretched pretty thin, especially during the hunting seasons. Having the Auxiliary doing safety patrols give them vital flexibility to use their resources elsewhere.

Guest Speaker, from "The Gold Side" MST1 Ashley Schad, also thanked us for all of the work we do to aid him in his local Coast Guard mission.

He elaborated that our volunteerism goes even further than we might imagine, allowing him much appreciated family time as he gestured toward his young family in the audience.

Commodore Rick Schal emphasized the fact that the Gold Side (Coast Guard) needs our help, assistance and expertise more than ever due to new additional assignments, sequestration and personnel cut backs. As a result of this increased need, many new opportunities have been opened to the Auxiliary. Some of the specific new needs and opportunities are as follows;

1. TCO (Telecommunications Operator) Allowing Auxiliary Members to work at Coast Guard Communication Facilities.
2. Mandated Training - Allowing Auxiliary Members to work on ships, at Sectors, Units and Detachments.

COMO Schal pointed out, this type of training is no different than that required for all federal employees and has gained traction in the cooperate world. We might as well lead the way, embrace it and learn from it to make us all better Auxiliarist, employees and citizens)

3. Additional and expanded C-Schools to increase Auxiliary expertise.
4. New Public Affairs I, II and III Classifications to meet Coast Guard PA Standards.
5. Higher standards for Coxswain and Crew.
6. CPR, First Aid and First Responder training.
7. AUXCHEF, just re-named to "Culinary Specialist" to allow Auxiliary Members to work on Ships and at CG Stations.

***Mandated Training While a Challenge For Some Members, But a Vital Element to be Relevant in Today's Auxiliary.***

8. Interpreter Program for assistance with Non-English speaking individuals.
9. Trident Program to assist the CG in their legacy Marine Safety and Environmental Protection Programs.
10. Dealer Visitor Program to assist the CG in Recreational Boating Safety efforts.
11. Paddle Craft Safety Programs to reverse the trend of accidents and deaths in this relatively new boating area.
12. Un-inspected Towing Vessel Inspectors and Un-inspected Passenger Vessel Inspectors to assist the CG in Vessel Inspections.
13. Watch Stander Qualification to assist the CG in Watch Standing duties at Stations and on Ships
14. Train Volunteers for the new Coast Guard Museum at New London, CT scheduled to open in 2019.

In conclusion, he challenged the entire membership to take advantage of these new opportunities and be a true **"Force Multiplier"** for the Coast Guard.

One of the final official duties of the current Commodore was to lead the Division Officers for 2017 in their oath. Charged up and ready to

embrace these new roles and challenges. Members raised their right hands and repeated the words which have no doubt been a right of passage for the leadership of the Auxiliary for more than Seventy Five years. It is worth noting, many of these individuals have taken on multiple elected and appointed responsibilities at the Flotilla, Division and even the

District level. There is certainly a role for everyone in the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary to **"Be Relevant"**.

On behalf of the Director of Auxiliary's, Nick Frascella took the helm and gave us much insight from the "Gold Side". Covering many of the same points as Rick Schall from a different point of view. The overall theme of the night and his main point was: **"Making the Auxiliary Relevant to the Coast Guard"**. Additional points he discussed were the opening of proposed National Coast Guard Museum. This will create a new and unique opportunity for Auxiliarist to travel to New London Connecticut, train and learn in-depth Coast Guard history, then serve as docents and guides in and around the museum attractions. This sparked a lot of interest and conversation amongst those in attendance.

Mr. Frascella finished his speech by thanking the Division for all of its efforts on his watch as he stated his plans for retirement from active invited to trade his gold buttons for silver and join the ranks of the Auxiliary.

At this point I am going to break away from the speech given at Change of Watch and go a bit deeper. I had an opportunity to speak with COMO Ventress at length to get to know the man, his drive and his vision. I first met Randy when I joined and had to have my finger prints done. We met at a Marina where he was also setting up a future boater safety event. I saw right then he was a leader who stays involved and on the move.

During his 13 years in the Auxiliary, he has gone through the elected progression of Flotilla Commander, Division Commander, District Captain, District Chief of Staff, and now beginning his two year term as District Commodore. Along the way, he has also held every Flotilla Level office with the exception of FSO of Finance. I mentioned during the swear in of Division officers, some people take on multiple responsibilities, Randy is no exception, in fact I would say he is the example. By my count he held 7 appointed or elected positions in 2016, all of which require dedication, training and time.

Randy Ventress "Wakes up Thinking Auxiliary" and a key part of his leadership is his stated belief, "Serving the needs of our members, the Coast Guard, and our Communities" is what its all about,

with an emphasis on our members. "I believe our members are our most important resource" and we plan to offer more information and **Value Added** training to our members. I believe that an informed member is a happy member and it all goes to serve our primary mission Recreational Boating Safety".

"I want our members to know who their leaders are, and I don't want them to think I'm in a different universe than they are. Everyone in the Auxiliary is a member of a Flotilla, and we have the same issues as any member. As members we have the **Right Thing**, and that is found in the New Member Pledge. As leaders we have the added responsibility of doing the **Right Thing** for all of our members, and that is in the Pledge we take as Elected and Appointed Officers".

"When I first came into the Auxiliary the last thing I wanted to be was a grumpy old Commodore. I never considered myself a leader, ever. I have always prided myself as being a team player, and I still do. When I started Leadership Training in the Auxiliary something grabbed me. I wanted to help our members, and my thoughts were that I could help best by leading the way. I guess that led me to becoming the grumpy old Commodore".

"I'm doing the thing I like to do in the Auxiliary and that is helping each members get what they need, supporting the Coast Guard, and educating the boating public in the many areas that we can use our expertise in".

Doing more with less has long been an underlying theme in the U.S. Coast Guard. Perhaps that is what historically has made the Auxiliary vital to accomplishing the overall mission. "In District Eight Eastern Region we have a very strong Executive Committee, a strong Board, and a strong, energetic District Staff. Another strength, is the Director of Auxiliary, LCDR Jaime Salinas, who is working in our best interest and putting his full weight of support behind us".

When I began this interview, I thought it was going to be the history of Randy Ventress, but it is really the future, his leadership and plan to train and empower every member willing to get on board. COMO Ventress has taken the helm, and is leaning in. The line at the bottom of his email sums it up best.

Recognition is received through the well-deserved awards presented throughout the change of watch proceedings. In many cases this is considered to be the Auxiliarist's paycheck.

Every year across Middle Tennessee active members of Division Eleven teach boating safety classes to the public and provide free vessel safety checks in an effort to educate and promote recreational boating safety. Auxiliary members engage in marine safety patrols, search and rescue operations and environmental cleanups in support of the active duty Coast Guard personnel. Auxiliarist also stand radio watches at many Coast Guard stations and provide culinary service by preparing meals at stations or on Coast Guard vessels far and wide.
