Marlinspike Seamanship - Too Valuable to Ignore

As this is my first article for our newsletter, I think it's best that I start with a brief reminder that your FSO-MT is your best resource for your flotilla's individual needs in member training. If there is something that they need to assist them, then we can easily stick to our Chain of Leadership, and pass it on up.

Details are being worked out on some new mandated training for all of us, but since it's not final yet, I don't want to bore everyone with details just yet. Instead, I will offer an idea that each of us can do pretty consistently that will make all of us better mariners.

Idea #1; Knots and Marlinspike. These skills can really atrophy if not used on a fairly regular basis, so a way to help all of us keep these skills sharp is to use a variation of a trick I learned for PE courses. Sponsor a knot of the month!! I know it sounds crazy but bear with me.

At your next flotilla meeting, after the business meeting concludes, pick a knot. Maybe start with a beckett

bend? Or a timber hitch? Have someone demonstrate the knot and how to tie it properly. Then as each of you have down time, practice that knot. When your next flotilla meeting comes around, right before the start of the business meeting, everyone can review the knot you chose. After the business meeting is over, learn a new knot. Just keep repeating the process with a new knot every month. By the end of the year, you will have added 12 knots, or maybe even a couple of splice methods to your skill sets.

In the Galley with Scott

Welcome to the galley! In this first column of "In the Galley with Scott" I would like to share with you one of my favorite quick dishes. Sliced Tomato with Fresh Mozzarella! I prefer fresh homegrown garden tomatoes for this dish coupled with fresh mozzarella. Any tomato will do in a pinch, but it just has to be a ball of fresh mozzarella. Rounding out the ingredients would be extra virgin olive oil, balsamic vinegar, and some fresh basil seasoning. Let's take one nice size garden

tomato and cut it into four slices. Lay them flat on the plate, don't stack them. Top each tomato slice with a slice of fresh mozzarella. Now, pour a drizzle of extra virgin olive oil, then pour a drizzle of balsamic vinegar, and lastly sprinkle with fresh basil. A perfect dish for any season, but especially good served slightly chilled or cool while at anchor on your boat.

Sea Scouting Sails on Clinton Lake

Sea Scouting is a co-ed program for young men and young ladies with ages ranging from 14-21. The youth members do not have to have been Boy Scouts previously to join this nautical program. Sea Scouts have been around since 1912, when the first unit or "Ship" was formed in England on Brown Sea Island. Commander Thomas Keane is the man responsible for bringing

Sea Scouts to the U.S. and making the 7000 member program what it is today.

The program is based on nautical skills. The first Sea Scout rank earned is Apprentice. They will then learn an incredible amount of seamanship and leadership as they progress through the ranks of Ordinary Seaman and then Able Seaman, finally earning the highest rank in Sea Scouting, Quartermaster. The Quartermaster is named after the Sailing Master of old who used his mastery of the art of sailing and

seamanship to assist the Captain.

The USCG Auxiliary has an active Memorandum of Understanding with the Sea Scouts.

Flotilla 84 is working with several Sea Scouts from Ship 007 in Champaign. The Skipper of Ship 007 is Mrs. Julie Ramsey. Several of our young men took their test for the Apprentice rank aboard "The Floating Illini" this summer and successfully passed.
