

Did You Know?

- June 23, 1939—Congressional legislation establishes the Coast Guard Reserve as a volunteer civilian organization for the purpose of promoting recreational boating safety ad to facilitate the operations of the Coast Guard.
- February 19, 1941—Congressional legislation changes the name of the reserve to the Auxiliary and in addition, creates a military Coast Guard Reserve under which enrollees are subject to military law and the Articles of War.
