Chicago River Emphasis Plans

At the District conference in Lisle, we repeatedly heard the importance of reaching out to *paddlecraft* with our safety efforts. CWO Robinson had challenged Division 35 to participate with the efforts on the rivers, where we see a growing presence of kayaks and canoes. The City of Chicago is encouraging developers to rent paddlecraft, electric

boats, and small pontoon boats. The renters do not always have the knowledge needed to stay out of trouble.

This project is going to require "all-hands" to accomplish it successfully. Phil Aszling, SO-PE 35 will be looking for locations and instructors to present a regular rotation of ABS classes throughout the spring and summer months.

Jennifer Hampton, SO-VE 35 will be working with Nevin Hofing (Flo 3512) who has completed over 250 paddlecraft VSCs each of the past two years, to increase the number of vessels we reach.

Jim Bell, SO-OP 35 will coordinate patrol activities to increase our presence on the Chicago River.

Program visitors will be encouraged to distribute literature specifically for paddlecraft operators in locations that may reach our target group.

We have a lot of work to organize and coordinate over the winter months. Share your ideas with your Flotilla leadership, so they can take them to Division.

PE at D-TRAIN: Questions and Challenges

The Public Education session at last month's D-TRAIN in Lisle updated attendees on several continuing trends and projects. The main message: challenges have emerged; questions remain. To summarize:

- The new mandatory boater-education law in Illinois will expand the market for Auxiliary courses, but no one can put a number on that. This "progressive" law affects a new and theoretically larger age group each year: anyone under 18 on 1JAN2016; under 19 the next year later ... etc. How many in this group will tend toward taking our ABS course? Much depends on the anticipated proliferation of online safety courses.
- In competing with online products what "unique selling proposition" can we offer for our classroom ABS? If we charge \$30, we can compete with IL DNR on price, because they charge online students that much for taking the final exam and getting the state card. But can we sell "live" interactive instruction from experienced boaters against the convenience of "learning at home"?
- The Auxiliary continues to develop its own online basic course, but it's not clear how close to launch that product might be. The developers are looking at a course that combines online learning with classroom reinforcement. Great idea! How much of the former; how much of the latter? How would course charges be assessed and distributed?
- Few Flotillas conduct Paddlesports America. Two problems: not many paddlers in our Flotillas, and we can't instruct on the water (for insurance reasons). National is exploring co-teaching with groups such as the American Canoe Association. Again, how to apportion fees? Also, our own canoeist Dave Bickel of 35-06 simulates on-the-water realities very effectively in class using inflated tire inner tubes and dollies with casters.

• The planned expansion of boat-rental facilities on the Chicago River challenges the Auxiliary to offer boating-safety training to potentially large markets on a continuing basis. Currently the division of responsibility between rental-boat owners and the renting public is not clear. Will renters be required to show boatereducation cards? If not, what responsibility do owners bear? And can we tailor training to their needs?

Many questions, seeking answers!

"Fox Hunting" - Nautical Style

Members of the Amateur Radio community (aka "HAMS" have long enjoyed searching for radio stations (stationary or mobile) in a sport referred to fox hunting. Just as members of the Auxiliary enjoy developing specialized equipment and techniques for our endeavors, these radio enthusiasts have developed specialized equipment and procedures to find elusive transmitters.

This can be useful in the marine environment. Have you ever heard a microphone accidently keyed on the Distress channel? Other people yell at the offender, not realizing their comments will not be heard as long as the offending radio is transmitting. How do we identify the transmitting radio to clear Channel 16? Or, what about the *joker* who likes to abuse the Calling Frequency by conducting a prolonged conversation with his buddies? Worst of all is the malicious hoax that likes to see boats race by with blue lights and sirens, when there is no distress.

Sophisticated and expensive equipment can be used

to find these stations, but a hand-held radio can often have the same results. Check back in future issues for details.





<u>Member Training – Patrols Class again</u> Offered by Division 39



Information from VE Staff and DIRAUX

10-17-14 - Laketown Township, MN

It was a dangerous 24 hours on a lake west of the metro. A 6-year-old boy drowned in Lake Parley on Friday, and a 60-year-old man drowned in the same lake on Saturday. Authorities say preliminary

information indicates Hunter Andrew Heyrman, 6, of St. Bonifacious, was duck hunting with his father Friday morning when the boat he was in by himself drifted away from the dock. Hunter's father, Chad Heyrman, told investigators that he tried to swim after the boat and retrieve it, but was unsuccessful. The boat was located a short time later, and Hunter was no longer in it. Authorities found the boy in the water and rescuers began CPR. He was taken to Ridgeview Hospital in Waconia where he was pronounced dead. Police say the boy was not wearing a life jacket, and Carver County Chief Deputy Jason Kamerud said this is an unfortunate reminder to use caution. "This time of year the cold water can be dangerous. Wear a life jacket and be safe while enjoying the outdoors," he said. Less than 24-hours after the child drowned, officials with the Carver County Sheriff's Office say a 60-year-old man who was duck hunting on the same lake fell into the water. Authorities say Dean William Buetow was taken to Hennepin County Medical Center where he later died. Officials don't believe he was wearing a life jacket at the time of the incident.

Some things never seem to change:

Many years ago, a Director of Auxiliary speaking at a District Conference related a air flight he took. While he was seated in the aircraft, he commonly would take the opportunity to discuss boating safety with passengers near him.

When he would ask his neighbors if they were boaters, the most frequent response was "No" ... but they would often go on to acknowledge that they were hunters, or fishermen, SCUBA divers, or water skiers. These people all used boats in their pursuits, but they did not consider themselves *boaters*.

The morale of the story was that many *boaters* don't recognize themselves. Our challenge includes helping these people identify the importance of staying safe to and from their primary endeavors.

Public Affairs

Over 9-10 OCT, David Bickel (Flo 3506) and David Mosca (Flo 3509) assisted ME2 Tony Emanuele from the Chicago Recruiters Office at 37th Annual Chemical Industry Council of Illinois (CICI) Career Conference in Chicago.

Questions from the students ranged from requirements to enlist in the Coast Guard, to nautical protocol, requirements to qualify as an officer, and how Coast Guard activities relate to oil spills and the marine environment.





Support Our Military At Holidays

As a young Auxiliarist, my first flotilla (22-18, Des Plaines) would collect home-baked Christmas goodies at our December meeting and distribute them to the local Coast Guard units (Station Wilmette, Air Station Chicago, and Station Calumet Harbor).
