When they got back to Chicago, they were too tired to find their slip – so they pulled into another harbor and slept overnight. (Harbor checks never found them, because they weren't registered with the harbor.) When the Coast Guard called the reporting source (a babysitter) for more information around 0900 the next morning, the missing boaters answered the phone! (Nobody called the CG to say they got safely home, either.)

"Fox Hunting" - Nautical Style

It is getting harder to find economically priced radio direction equipment for marine VHF frequencies. Two styles have been sold over the years: omni-directional Doppler or rotating antennas that would provide a line of position to the transmitter, and "homers" that would indicate when your vessel is pointed toward the transmitter. Both required special receiving antennas.

Before specialized equipment became available, early techniques were developed using basic equipment. When the signal is transmitted for long periods, distance can be used to create lines of position.

Turn the squelch up so that the signal is just breaking squelch continuously. Proceed on a course until the signal disappears, and record the position. Then return on the reciprocal course until the signal disappears again, and record the position again. Plot the segment between these two points on a chart, and return to the midpoint of this segment. When you arrive at the midpoint, turn 90°. If the signal gets stronger, you should be on a course to the



source. If the signal gets weaker, reverse course. Obviously, this is method takes a lot of time.

Another method used a hand-held transceiver or receiver and body-shielding. Begin by minimizing the signal (either increasing the squelch or collapsing a telescoping antenna) until the signal is just audible. Then hold the radio close to your body. This will block one direction of reception. By spinning in a circle slowly, you should be able to determine a general direction of transmission. Proceed in that direction as long as the signal is increasing, then repeat the procedure as needed until the source is determined.

This method of body shielding was used in Kenosha harbor by (then) SO-CM V to find an active EPIRB when high-tech equipment (on a Coast Guard 41' and provided by Civil Air Patrol) was confused by signals reflected from sailboat masts. (The transmitter had been placed on its side by the owner's family when they borrowed the boat – activating a false alarm!)
