

Hacker Tracks By Chris Doutre, FSO-CS

Last month. I wrote about how a hacker can take control of your email account and spam all your contacts with a phony plea for money help. Since then, I have seen a different kind of threat: I have received three strange messages from two different earthlink.net webmail users. In two cases, the message contained a single hyperlink, nothing else, no text, no signature, nothing, only hyperlinks with cz (Czech) and pl (Poland) domain names. In another case, the message was a sales pitch for male enhancement drugs, sent from a very professional industry manager, who is also a sailor and a very proper Mom. In all three cases, it was an instant red flag: I did not click on any links, and I contacted the sending party to let them know that their email had been hacked. As I warned last month, the hackers of the world are hard at work and you will probably be seeing more and more of these dangerous emails in the future. To protect yourself, you must resist the urge to open the hyperlinks in these messages. If you open such a link, it will almost certainly install malware on your PC; maybe a virus, maybe a key logger that sends your passwords to the bad guys, or maybe a full-fledged remote control program that

lets the bad guys take over your PC from afar. All of these are very bad news. In that brief instant that you drop your guard, the damage is done and you will probably have plenty of trouble recovering the use of your online identity. So don't do it. And if you have not read my article from last month, please do so at your earliest convenience. Let's all educate ourselves and help each other. If you have questions about email security, please talk to me.
