#### **New Boats at Station Bellingham** by Chris Doutre, FSO-PB

Station Bellingham has recently received the latest in response boat technology. It's the new Response Boat – Medium (RB-M); it's 45 feet long and 15 feet wide, and will replace the 41 foot utility boats (UTB-41). The RB-M weighs 36,000 pounds, is self-righting, and can achieve a max speed of more than 40 knots. It has a range of 260 nautical miles and a towing capacity of 100 tons. Get ready for some new training opportunities. Here's a Coast Guard press release about the RB-M from 2008.



Tacoma, Wash. (March 3, 2008) - The Response Boat-Medium (RB-M) is an all-aluminum, 45-foot boat with twin diesel engines and water jet propulsion. It was launched today at Commencement Bay in Tacoma, Wash. This small boat, which recently completed a successful Builder's Trials on March 3, is expected to be the primary non-heavy weather, multi-mission capable boat for the U.S. Coast Guard. The RB-M will have increased maneuverability and be capable of speeds in excess of 40 knots (46 miles per hour). A full cabin will provide crew protection from the elements and will be equipped with a robust navigation system. heating and air conditioning, shock mitigating seats, and a communication system capable of communicating with other federal, state and local Homeland Security organizations. The RB-M's missions will include Search and Rescue (SAR), Enforcement of Laws and Treaties (ELT), Ports, Waterways, and Coastal Security (PWCS), Defense Operations (DO), Marine Environmental Protection (MEP), and Recreational Boating Safety (RBS).
