Bow riding refers to passengers riding with their legs dangling over the side of the boat's bow. It's dangerous because bow-riding passengers are significantly more likely to fall into the water. You can be hit by the boat or propeller. It is illegal in many states.

The Massachusetts law, <u>323 Mass. Reg. 2.07</u>, says "A person operating a motorboat underway shall not permit anyone to ride or sit on the gunwales or on the decking of a bow, unless the motorboat is equipped with adequate guard rails to prevent persons from falling overboard." If caught you could be charged a significant fine.
