<u>06/documents/a recreational boaters guide to vessel sewage.pdf</u>, prohibits the discharge of untreated sewage into U.S. waters, including all inland waters, the Great Lakes, and coastal waters extending to three miles from shore. The discharge of any treated or untreated sewage is prohibited in freshwater lakes, ponds, reservoirs, and rivers unnavigable by interstate vessel traffic.
