

#### **CORONAVIRUS 2019 nCoV** (Submitted by Karen Weber, BQ)

The coronavirus—named for the appearance of crown-like spikes on its surface--is causing a rapidly spreading respiratory illness originating in the city of Wuhan, Hubei Province, in China. Tens of thousands have been infected and millions quarantined. This strain of coronavirus is indeed the latest pandemic to affect our world. As of February 7, 337 people in 36 states are

being monitored for possible infection. Documented cases have been found in Washington State, California, Nevada, Wisconsin, Illinois and Massachusetts.

Cases of the virus in the US are being imported by infected travelers; however, the CDC reports that there is currently no data to suggest that the virus is spreading in the community in the United States.

Coronaviruses are not new. Many species of mammals and reptiles, i.e. cattle, pigs, birds, cats, dogs, rodents, bats and snakes are known to carry or be infected by some form of coronavirus. However, there are currently seven known types of coronaviruses which can cause human infection: SARS (Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome) which started in **Guangdong Province, China** in November 2002; MERS (Middle East Respiratory Syndrome) stemming from Saudi Arabia in 2012; and now 2019 Novel Coronavirus from Wuhan China are just a few. They are transferrable not only from animal to human but also from human to human.

The mode of transmission is thought to be via inhalation of infected droplets. It is unclear as yet whether the virus can be transmitted by touching infected surfaces. It has been reported that the infection can be communicated by an asymptomatic host within an incubation period of 2-14 days. Transmission of the virus may occur from a seemingly healthy individual. Those most susceptible to severe illness are the very old, the very young, the immunocompromised or individuals having underlying disease.

Test kits for respiratory specimens have been made available by the CDC, but require complex laboratory equipment capable of conducting RNA analysis so data on confirmed positive testing is rolling in very slowly. Screening includes taking a travel history and a temperature. Those suspected of being infected may be subject to quarantine for up to 14 days.

Transmissibility continues to be studied and risk is low, but protect yourself from infection. Handwashing is still the best way to minimize the spread of disease.

- Wash hands frequently with soap and water
- Use hand sanitizer
- Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing with a tissue or sleeve
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, mouth
- Boost your immune system with good health habits: healthy diet, regular exercise and plenty of rest
- Disinfect frequently touched surfaces in your home
- Stay home if you suspect have been exposed or if you're not feeling well
- AVOID NON-ESSENTIAL TRAVEL

If you have been in China within the past 2 weeks or have been in close contact with a person with 2019-nCoV, and develop a fever, cough or have difficulty breathing, contact your health care provider right away.
