

Standing at Attention

- Stand straight shoulders squared
- Heels together 45-degree angle don't lock knees
- Arms straight down seam hands cupped thumbs down
- Look straight ahead head level don't smile



Standing at Attention









- Touch tip of forefinger/middle finger to lower part of cover or forehead
 - above and slightly right of right eye palm down
 - Hold upper arm horizontal forearm 45 degrees


Raise right hand smartly

fingers together

*Always salute a Medal of Honor recipient no matter what the rank

Shipboard Etiquette



- Request permission from the Officer of the Deck (OOD) to board or leave
- As you board, stand at the gangway and salute the national ensign at the stern

during hours when flag is not displayed, salute area where flag normally is

Turn to OOD/rep, salute and say "Request permission to come aboard sir/ma'am"



- When leaving the ship, do same actions in reverse salute/request permission to go ashore, then salute flag as you cross the gunwale
- If not in uniform, do not salute, but perform same steps
- *Senior officers board a boat or enter a vehicle last and depart first




- Behind the speaker or head table placed above and behind the speaker union uppermost and to the flag's own right, the audience's left
- From a staff

accorded a position of superior prominence over any flag displayed in the same room only flag that may be displayed behind and right of the speaker, left of the audience



All other flags, including the Auxiliary ensign, displayed in the same room will be placed on the speaker's left and to the audience's right





> On a Boat

at the stern, ideally on the flagpole or on the stern forestay must be the largest flag on the ship sunrise to sunset, hoisted first, lowered last no other flag may be flown unless the national ensign is also flown when leaving boat in port, the flag should be taken down if not returning before sunset



size of the national ensign is in proportion to the length of the boat, minimum of one inch of flag per foot of overall boat length

upside down national ensign should not be relied on as a distress signal on the high seas or in foreign waters



Funerals



- Attendees, honor guard, or part of funeral
- Make known that services are available
- DIRAUX should be notified; flotilla commander should call on family in person
- Participating in uniform Service Dress Blue
- Auxiliary service held before church service, usually evening before
- *Committal given by the family's clergy

Auxiliarist Rank



- Civilians who do not hold <u>rank</u> or <u>authority</u>!
- Authorized to wear the insignia of the highest office held and the past device
- When augmenting AD/R personnel, the militarystyle insignia of Auxiliary position is removed and Auxiliary member insignia is worn
