




To go Off-Shore, an Auxiliary Vessel <u>must</u> have two crew members, <u>regardless</u> of size. If you are given a case to go Off-Shore and you do not have two crew members, notify KBR, who will relay to Group Miami O.D. <u>He</u> will make decision if you are to proceed. This is a change from current practice.

When you come upon a vessel needing assistance and are on regular patrol, you do not need to "get permission" prior to lending any assistance. Lend assistance and then notify KBR as soon as possible. Your "Orders of the Day" are permission.

RESOLUTIONS

The Miami Search and Rescue Team (MISART) shall be comprised of highly qualified and trained specialists in Seamanship, First Aid, Communications, and SAR techniques.

It is the <u>intent</u> of this resolution to provide the guidelines for the team participation in the operations programs of Division VI.It is the <u>object</u> of this resolution, to foster the high degree of professionalism, which all of the team will be proud of.

----GENERAL INFORMATION-----

- 1. In order to participate in DIV.VI operations, a B.Q.'d or AUXOP member must be MISART qualified.
- 2. Crew requirements -Minimum

Class A & 1-Skipper & 1 crew

Class 2 & 3-Skipper & 2 crew

- Any flybridge boat, or any boat going off shore, must have skipper & 2 crew.
- 3. An observer does not count as crew, however, should be counted and listed on mission man hour cards, after the crew.
- 4. The scheduling of vessels for operations, will be handled by the SO-OP and the FSO-OP.
- 5. The MISART practical demonstration for skipper and crew, shall be given by the SO-OP or his designate. For logistic purposes, the SO-OP may designate one member to assist in giving the MISART demonstration.
- 6. All skippers and crew <u>must</u> be in proper uniform while on S.A.R. or Regatta patrol.
- 7. S.A.R. patrol hours commences at 1100 hours, until 1 hour after sunset.

----OBTAINING MISART QUALIFICATION-----

- 1. In order to qualify for MISART, any B.Q.'d or AUXOP member of DIV.VI must:
 - (a) Attend a MIsart course. This minimum 8 hour course shall include lessons in S.A.R, First Aid, Communications, and Seamanship.
 - (b) Take a practical demonstration under supervision of SO-OP DIV.VI or his designate.
 - (c) Participate as an observer for 2 S.A.R. patrols. Minimum of 16 hours of S.A.R. patrol required prior to being qualified to perform as either skipper or crew.

-----MAINTAINING MISART QUALIFICATIONS-----

- 1. Once qualified, a MISART member must participate in S.A.R. for a minimum of 16 hours as a skipper or crew in a 12 month period. This period will correspond with AUXMIS calendar year.
- 2. If a MISART member is unable to perform the required minimum hours of S.A.R. patrol, that member may requalify one year only by accomplishing the following:
 - (a) Attend a MISART Seminar,
 - (b) Participate as a skipper or crew for 2 S.A.R. patrols with a minimum of 16 hours.
- 3. A MISART member may requalify by seminar for one year. the second and and future years, the requalification requirements are as follows:
 - (a) Attend a Misart course. This minimum 8 hour course, shall include lessons in S.A.R., First Aid, Communications, and Seamanship.
 - (b) Participate as an Observer for 2 S.A.R. patrols, with a minimum of 16 hours.
 - (c) Participate as skipper or crew for 2 S.A.R. patrols with a minimum of 16 hours.

REQUIREMENTS FOR SKIPPERS MISART PRACTICAL

Must demonstrate boat handling ability on skippers own vessel.

Skipper must demonstrate his proficiency in the following:

- (a) Man overboard drill.
- (b) Tow long, short, alongside,(c) Approach to a burning vessel,
- (d) Plot and run search patterns, (E) Radio procedure,
- (f) Marlinspike,
- (g) Locate and recognize local charts, aids to navigation, landmarks, problem areas, marinas, ect.
- Vessel used for MISART practical, shall be inspected and have submitted for offer of use.
- Vessel used for Practical demonstration, shall have all the equipment on board as required in the offer of use, inspection check off sheet, CGD 7-4951.

In addition the following material should be on board,

- (a) Search and Rescue book CG,
- (b) Auxiliary Towing Guide Ch. 484,
- (c) Mooring lines.

REQUIREMENTS FOR CREW MISART PRACTICAL

- 1. Crew must demonstrate his proficiency in the following,

 - (a) Duties during man overboard,(b) Line handling during towing, long, short, alongside,
 - (c) Duties when approaching a burning vessel,
 - (d) Plot search patterns,
 - (e) Radio procedure.
 - (f) Marlinspike,
 - (g) Locate and recognize on local charts, aids to navigating, landmarks, problem areas, marinas, ect.
 - (h) Locate disabled vessel by co-ordinates.

When announcing or vocally stating courses or bearings, always sound off by pronouncing exactly three digits -- digit by digit. For example: (a) "Steer course 062 (ZERO SIX TOO)". (b) "We bear 195 (WUN NINER FIYUV) from Marker 25 (TOO SIX)".

Relative bearings from your vessel may be properly expressed in two ways. (a) Relative bearings which are measured from dead ahead ("000 Relative" or "360 Relative") in a clockwise direction. "Broad on the starboard beam" would be 090 Relative; "Dead Astern" would be 180 Relative; "Broad on the port beam"-- 270 Relative.

(b) "Point System". Relative bearings under this system are described as shown in the accompanying sketch. There are 32 points (easy to learn). A "point" is equivalent to 1110.

Permission from Coast Guard Group Miami, or Coast Guard Auxiliary key Biscayne Radio is not required prior to assisting a disabled vessel while on S.A.R. patrol under orders.

In order to maintain good S.A.R. coordination, S.A.R. information must be relayed as soon as possible to Coast Guard Group Miami, or Key Biscayne Radio.

If towing a vessel, the auxiliarist <u>must</u> take the vessel to the closest safe harbor.

Patrol hours are from 1100 hours local time, to 1 hour after sunset.

Off shore vessels should have skipper and two (2) <u>Misart Qualified</u> crew members.

Flotilla 6-11 NAVIGATION NOTES FOR JUNE

A nautical mile is defined as the length of one minute of arc of a great circle on the surface of the earth (such as the equator). One mile is exactly 1 852 metres (which is approximately 6,076 feet). For easy arithmetic, one mile is considered to be 6,000 feet or 2,000 yards. One knot, then, translates to about 100 feet per minute or 100 yards every three minutes.

A simple way to mentally calculate distance, therefore, is to multiply your speed (in knots) by 100. If you're making 12 knots, your distance traveled each minute is 12 times 100 or 1200 feet. In three minutes, the distance would be 1200 yards or about 0.6 miles.
