# The Helm's EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW with Eduardo Burbank, DCP6

The Helm spoke to the newly elected Division Captain

The Helm: How did you become involved with the Auxiliary?

**Eduardo Burbank:** My father introduced me for the first time to the shores of the Pacific Ocean; we took sail on a small but seaworthy sloop. That day began my first lesson in navigation and seamanship. I felt then the powerful and mystical call of the sea. Many years have passed since that initial experience, and I have kept an enduring attraction for the sea, a love that has only increased with the passing of time.

It was June 1997 when I attended my first Auxiliary Flotilla Meeting in Miami. I began then to learn about the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary. It did not take long for me to realize that I had found a new call in life, one that would associate me with professional, knowledgeable and dedicated men and women, strongly committed to a worthy mission. Shortly thereafter, I joined Flotilla 65 and became Basic Qualified on August 12<sup>th</sup> 1997. I have held elected and appointed positions, receiving numerous awards and citations. I have also qualified as a Public Education Instructor, Vessel Examiner, Sensor Manager in the HAWKEYE project and other programs.

**Eduardo Burbank:** On a short personal basis, I was born in the sea port of Callao, Peru. When I was 17, I left my country of birth to study International Marketing at the University of Michigan (Go Wolverines).

# **Learn Something New Every Issue**



The Commandant of the US Coast Guard is the highest ranking member of the US Coast Guard. He is the only four-star Admiral of the Coast Guard, and is appointed for a four year term by the President of the United States upon confirmation of the US Senate. He is assisted by a Vice-Commandant, two Assistant Commandants/Area Commanders and a Chief of Staff, all of whom are three-star Vice Admirals. Unlike the Commandant of the Marine Corps, The Coast Guard Commandant is not a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He reports to the President, the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Secretary of Defense. Prior to the creation of the Department of Homeland Security in 2003, the Coast Guard Commandant reported to the Secretary of Transportation.
