Roaring Skies at Wings over Homestead

On November 6th and 7th, more than 400,000 spectators flocked to the 2010 *Wings Over Homestead Airshow* at the Homestead Air Reserve Base. The Blue Angels, the Geico Skytypers Airshow Team, and the Air Force F-16 Demo Team were just a few of the performers that demonstrated jaw-dropping acrobatic stunts for the public.

In addition to watching bi-planes and jets perform daring maneuvers, airshow attendees also had the opportunity to view several interactive displays, take a shot at the rock climbing walls, and even climb aboard the U.S. Coast Guard's HH 65 Dolphin helicopter, a twin-engine helicopter used for Search and Rescue missions.

Planes on display included a Delta Airlines Boeing 757, a Rockwell B-1 Bone, and a vintage Eastern Airlines DC-7B passenger jet.

Also in attendance were the U.S. Coast Guard and Coast Guard Auxiliary members from Flotillas 61 and 6-11. The Auxiliary members spoke with the public about safety on the water and provided information on free vessel safety checks.

A Trip to Freedom

It was about 10:00 p.m. on June 28th, 1970, when we finally placed our homemade raft on the ocean.

This action ended a long two years of preparation. During this time, I had done careful planning about the safest way to leave my country of origin, Cuba, now under a severe communist regime. I was 22 years old. Legally no male between the ages of 15 and 27 is allowed to leave the country.

My only hope was to build my own means of transportation to the United States. Because building a boat would be complicated and time-consuming, I decided to construct a raft. I used four large (truck

Including myself, there were seven young men who become involved in this adventure. None of us knew anything about handling a boat on the ocean. As a guide, we planned to use the Sun during the day and the North Star at night.

We waited for the darkness of the night to take our vessel to the ocean, and as we pushed the raft into the water, one the men decided to stay behind because of the small size of the raft. We said our last good bye to him. As the humid wind blew against our faces, our sense of fear seemed to float in the night air...

For hours, we rowed hard in our effort to put the greatest distance between ourselves and the shore. We gradually learned how to row to the same rhythm. We were afraid of being spotted by the Marine Patrol. However, we knew that the raft was too small to be discovered by radar. By the next morning, we were slowly moving farther away from our native land.

We saw all kinds of marine life, including a huge turtle that tried to come aboard the raft. At night, thousands of phosphorescent plankton flashed in the night waters. Our constant companions were sharks, who no doubt followed in hopes of having one of us for dinner.

For the first day or two, we expected to be rescued quickly by a ship or an airplane from a free country. Unfortunately, we discovered that our tiny raft could not be seen, even by ships passing next to us.

By the fifth day, our food supplies were completely gone (we had brought only six cans of condensed milk and a gallon of water). Our bodies were weak and exhausted. In the afternoon, the heat was unbearable. At night, we trembled from the cold like leaves in a heavy wind.

On the six day, we were caught in a storm. The lightning and strong winds lasted for five hours. We stopped rowing and tied our bodies tightly to the raft with ropes. When the rain and the wind finally calmed down, we were even more exhausted and desperate.

One of the men suggested that we pray. Nothing else was left to do, so all of us pray together. Our long silence was interrupted only by the water splashing against the raft.

The next day, we used all our strength to row farther. The Sun was bright, the sea calm and peaceful. Almost at the end of the day, a large ship approached within two miles from us. In spite of our frantic rowing, it passed into the growing darkness.

As we looked at the dim horizon, another ship of the same proportions appeared. In a few minutes, the Esso Scranton was passing in front of our eyes. Once again, we rowed desperately and velled at the crew with our weak voices.

Thank God, as our hope was fading away, one of the crew saw us, he ran into the bridge and seconds later a column of heavy smoke came out of the ship's stacks as the loud horn of the ship sounded with three long roaring and menacing sounds, but to our ears it was the sound of angels....The ship slowly stopped and came to our rescue. This was one of the most wonderful moments of my life.


We soon learned that we were only ten miles from Miami Beach. A U.S. Coast Guard vessel quickly came to take us to the base on land (Station Miami Beach).

As we approached the shore, I noticed all kinds of fireworks lightening the sky, at that time; it seemed to be an exciting welcome for us. Once on land, I discovered the real situation.

We had arrived on July Fourth, Independence Day for this great country of freedom.

Today celebrate this day with double joy. It is not only a National Holiday, but also the day that I gained my freedom.

District 7 Aux Air

During the month of September 2010, United States Coast Guard (USCG) District 7 (D7) requested the support of Aux Air. They had been tasked with supplying a photo platform in support of a National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) project. The planning and air assets provided by D7 and the Auxiliary Air (Aux Air) is a critical component for the development of the Environmental Sensitivity Index (ESI) atlas for South Florida.

Funding for the South Florida ESI is

provided by NOAA's Office of Response and Restoration (OR&R), Emergency Response Division (ERD); the USCG; and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Fish and Wildlife Research Institute (FWRI).

The purpose of the aerial photography mission was to capture oblique images of all shoreline in South Florida. The oblique images will aid in classifying the shoreline based on type. Each shoreline type has a specific code that will be entered into a spatially enabled GIS (Geographic Information System) database. Research Planning, Inc. (RPI) will create for NOAA an Environmental Sensitivity Index database, which will provide a concise summary of coastal resources at risk to oil spills. The ESI data will include the ESI shoreline classification as well as biological and socio-economic resources. This product will be available to the public through NOAA's Office of Response and Restoration, Emergency Response Division (http://response.restoration.noaa.gov/index.php). It will include data representative of South Florida's shoreline types (Sand Beach, Mangrove, Riprap, Man Made).

The use of Active duty and crew would have put an enormous strain on the Air Station involved. Step in Aux Air. AAC J. J. Samuelson, of Air Station Miami, was contacted, and he began to coordinate this project. We are also in a period when our assets are limited. The solution was a joint effort from Aux Air Station Miami, Aux Air Station Clearwater, and Aux Air Station Savannah. Crews and facilities were assembled and schedules were developed.

Those who conducted the flights were Marvin Dailey, Daniel Ochsenschlager, Fouad "Sam" Samaha, Gerald Metcalf, Fred Ross, and Shon Limor from Air Station Clearwater. We also had Mike Renuart from Air Station Savannah and David Elliot from Air Station Miami—ready to finish up the week.

This mission was a little different from our usual patrols. Though we were conducting our flights within our normal search pattern altitudes, we were not flying normal patterns. A great deal of maneuvering was needed to follow the shorelines of all of South Florida. This allowed Mr. Minter the ability to photograph all of the shorelines throughout the Keys and the southern

peninsula. It was necessary to coordinate with all of the airports in South Florida, including the military. We also made contact with the personnel at the nuclear power plant at Turkey Point. Local knowledge played a big part in this operation.

The facilities used were a Twin Comanche for the offshore areas of the Dry Tortugas, a Cessna 182 for the Southern Keys, and a Cessna 210 for the upper Keys, southern peninsula, and up to the Port of Miami.

I would like to thank Doc Truthan for the use of his aircraft and AAC Lemon for arranging to allow Shon Limor opportunity to fly with us.

This project went from the 7th through the 16th of October of 2010. Blessed with good weather and dedicated crews, we were able to finish all that was requested of

us by midday on the 12th of October. That was four days ahead of schedule, even including a Presidential TFR (Temporary Flight Restriction)!

Education and Member Training in Division 6

Miami, Florida: Education and member training are important aspects of the Auxiliary's work. Throughout this year, Division 6 has carried out numerous education sessions for the public, including Boating Skills and Seamanship (BS&S) and About Boating Safely (ABS). Also, under the overall management of Monica Zima, Staff Officer for Member Training, Division 6 has conducted member training in many different areas, including Aids Verification, CPR, and First Aid; Marine Safety (IIMS), Patrols (AUXPAT), and Seamanship (AUXSEA), with proctoring for several exams; as well as numerous Team Coordination Training (TCT) sessions for approximately 50 Active Duty, Reservist, and Auxiliarist personnel. Five new Boat Crew members qualified in November.

Besides certifying many members in new areas and having them contribute to missions and events in these areas, other benefits are new instructors for classes and the creation of close bonds among members of different flotillas. This has created a true sense of teamwork and unity within Division 6. Throughout next year, the Division plans more training activities including Advanced Coastal Navigation, Auxiliary Search Coordination and Execution (AUXSC&E), and other topics. 
Know Your Knots: The Half-Hitch

Knots are an important part of an Auxiliarist's knowledge bank, especially if he or she is part of a boat crew. In this issue, we feature the "half-hitch" knot, another useful one.

"Hitches are used for temporarily securing a line to objects such as a ring or eye. One of their advantages is their ease in untying. The half hitch is the smallest and simplest hitch. It should be tied only to objects having a right-hand pull. Since a single half hitch may slip easily, care should be taken in cases where it will encounter stress." Source: Boat Crew Seamanship Manual, COMDTINST M16114.5C, 2003, pp. 7-29, 7-30.

Step Procedure

- 1 Pass the line around the object.
- 2 Bring the working end "a" around the standing part and back under itself.
