

Member Training Wayne Hoover

TS: This is an interview with FSO member training, Wayne Hoover, Who is the member training staff officer?

WH: In theory, I was supposed have been in at least a year to be a staff officer. When I came in, there was no member training, officer, and nobody knew exactly what to do. So I just alone figured out how to get through, core and all that, BQ, and Howard said, oh, good job. You're member training! There you go. He had to get us to make a waiver to allow me to do that. 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
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Submissions:

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TS: What does the member trainer officer do?

WH: Well, supposedly, he is a source for information, for all the members on what's available. in terms of training. what the requirements are for the various roles, and so forth. And then just supports them as they try to, complete that training. Normally, the way it should work, the way that Coast Guard likes it to work is you would start out with your member training and other officers, help you understand what's required and what's available and that kind of stuff. And then once you have the basic requirements down, like BQ and all those kind of things, then you're assigned a mentor, like, you were assigned with Dean Bell, I think, was. And then the mentor pretty well takes over and completes them through the training. But a number of staff officer are available if there's questions about what they need to complete.

TS: Where do you do these tasks?

WH: I do a lot of them on my computer, do emails. But it used to be we did them all at the flotilla building. And so we don't really have that anymore. But a lot of it's just by phone or by email. You know, that kind of thing. Unfortunately, it's hard to do things face to face right now, because we don't have a good spot to do that to you. We can't just walk in here and do that.

TS: What do you do?

WH: Okay, well. to start with, I have, you know, in our parallel management scheme. I have a staff officer above me at the district level who feeds me information about all kinds of training opportunities, training rules, changes, that kind of stuff. So, I pass that along to whoever might need it, okay? I also look at what people are doing and trying to decide if it looks like they're making progress, if they aren't, offer my assistance, to help them do that, especially if it's stuff like just trying to get through a test online, that kind of thing.

TS: What else do you do?

WH: I have to report our status once a month up through the chain of management. So I write a monthly report to the staff, the SO and the DSO at the next level's up from member training.

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TS: Why do you do it?

WH: To be real honest, it gave me a chance coming in as a brand new person to have a significant role. And I think I have pretty good interpersonal skills and stuff, so I think I can do a pretty good job with it.
