### **The Journey is the Thing**

Ellie and I have been sailors as long as we have been married. We took classes on Lake Erie, the Chesapeake Bay, Lake Michigan and the British Virgin Islands. In between we chartered boats at many locations so we have had exposure to a large number of boats and venues. For me, the Chesapeake and its many estuaries, creeks and byways as well as

islands large and small and little towns or villages were the most rewarding. Not only is it beautiful it is moody and historic. As far as I am concerned, America started there.

I took to sailing immediately. I understood it, I felt it, I loved it, I couldn't get enough. It took 2 hours to drive to Annapolis from where we were living and I gladly undertook that journey under many different conditions just to spend a weekend cruising or racing or waiting for the weather to turn so we could get home. Eventually we moved to Florida and for the first time I was close enough to sail any time I wanted – so I bought an old sailboat only to discover that it was too late. All the feelings are still there and most of the basic skills have survived but my body has not.

So now I spend more time reminiscing rather than sailing.

At first, I took my affinity to sailing for granted. It all made sense and the benefits were so obvious: water (salty or fresh) wind, sun, rain, heat, cold, calm trust and fear. Wait, fear? There were several times when we were scared out of our wits. We made questionable decisions and did some minor damage to fingers, toes, appendages of many sorts and left some paint and fiberglass behind as mementos. But most of the time life on the water was better than just about anything else we could think of. Bone tired but still fascinated by the sound of water lapping against the boat, the click of barnacles on the hull, the stars you never see from land, a moon as big as a house coming up over the dark shoreline and the glow of phosphorescent organisms at the water line - you drift off to sleep with the gentle motion of a boat safely at anchor. That's life!

All this time we worked at our careers, raised kids, traveled a bit, saw friends come and go and grew older. And, as old men do, I began to seek answers or explanations. To sum things up and make sense of how I got here. I used analogies and metaphors to try to track my life and came to the obvious conclusion that life, for me. is a lot like sailing (or is it the other way 'round?). And the similarities are significant on several levels. At first, we learn to row a little boat – progress is slow for a while and we go in circles until we learn to pull equally on both sides. One of the biggest discoveries is how to get from one point to another for a purpose beyond just the joy of pulling on the oars and moving forward.

The little boat gives way to something a bit bigger – perhaps a vessel that can accommodate more than one person. You learn to share your beloved craft and discover that others like it almost as much as you. You're glad they are there, together you discover new horizons and the value of teamwork and friendship. Eventually you want to test yourself and your vessel, to try to find the freedom implied by being on the water with something you are confident you can master. You plan voyages, equip yourself based on the cumulative knowledge you have gained and point your vessel toward anticipated new adventures. You fail, you succeed, you fall overboard but survive, you are hot and becalmed, you are cold and yearn for the shore but when you arrive you almost immediately start thinking about the next phase and you are complete. You may not be completely satisfied but you have faith in yourself.

One's life can be a lot like this. Starting and stopping, succeeding or failing, lost or certain of your destination but confident in your skills and armed with lessons learned. You plan and execute all sorts of voyages. I look around me and see a vast regatta, all of us "sailing" in more or less the same direction but at different speeds and with different rigs. All I know is to keep a firm grip on the tiller, trim your sails as you go, keep a weather eye out and enjoy the rest of the journey.


