High- and Low-Tech Combine to Make the 2011 Gasparilla Pirate Invasion One of the Safest Ever!

TAMPA BAY- Web-based technology and low-tech sign-boards utilized by the Coast Guard Auxiliary during the 2011 edition of the Gasparilla Pirate Invasion combined to help make this year's event one of the safest ever. And, the efforts of 23 facilities and 91 coxswains, boat crew, trainees and radio watchstanders from three Auxiliary Divisions: Seven, Eight and Eleven, made Auxiliary involvement in the 2011 invasion one of the largest in the 50 years the Auxiliary has been involved in the event.

As they have for years, Auxiliary vessels monitored security zones in the Port of Tampa and provided a deterrent presence in several key locations along the boat parade route. In addition, five Auxiliary boats and two personal watercrafts (PWC) served as platforms for the manatee watch effort coordinated by the Environmental Protection Commission.* Two other facilities were designated as 'response boats' and

assisted law enforcement agencies as needed.

This year, the Coast Guard and parade organizers established more encompassing 'No Wake Zones' in and around the parade route to better control the speed of participating vessels. The effort was largely successful, due in part to highly-visible "No Wake Zone" and "Slow Down" signboards created by Robin Conn, FL 79 and displayed by crewmembers aboard Auxiliary vessels.

For the first time during a Gasparilla event, Tampa Radio One watchstanders used Internet technology and their version of low—tech: a white board to monitor the status of all 23 Auxiliary facilities and to observe the hundreds of participating vessels in Seddon, Garrison and Sparkman channels. The 7029 Webform permits you to enter, keep track of, and submit your Administrative hours (99A - 99E) using any modern Web browser, from any computer on the Internet, anywhere you might happen to be.

It is vitally important that all members routinely and in a timely fashion report their administrative hours since the data becomes critical to funding and other resource allocations that can be important for our future as an organization. The 7029 Webform was designed to make this task as simple as possible.

The 7029 Webform also represents a breakthrough in our methods of data reporting and is an important first step in a long-term goal of significantly streamlining the entire data entry and management process.

It is for these reasons that I urge all members to visit the Webforms site at http://webforms.cgaux.org, read all of the information available there, and begin using the system in place of paper or PDF 7029 forms. Replace the paper and save a tree.

In addition, I urge all unit leaders to publicly announce the Webforms capability at your next unit meeting, proactively remind your members to transition to the system at subsequent meetings, and informally appoint a Webforms "promoter" who can help other members adapt to the easy-to-use system. It benefits us all.

la Staff Officer-Communications 79 and John Sanchez, Flotilla Staff Officer-Communications 74 used a web camera atop a downtown office building to view real time activity along the waterways and Automatic Identification System (AIS) technology to monitor the movements of larger vessels. Tampa Radio One provided the radio guard for all Auxiliary facilities entering the Station St. Pete area of responsibility and heading to their assigned positions throughout the early morning. Once all vessels arrived at assigned locations, their movement was controlled from aboard the Lucky Dog, the on-scene Auxiliary command and communications platform.

Overall, the communications component of the mission ran smoothly despite the heavy level of traffic on Channel 81A, which included routine reports and parade-related traffic between Tampa Radio One, Auxiliary vessels with manatee watchers aboard, the Environmental Protection Commission boat, Eagle Eight helicopter, Auxiliary Communications Control, the Coast Guard Patrol Commander and law enforcement boats.

Auxiliary units involved in the event encountered no major problems. One Auxiliary facility responded to a request by a

recreational vessel in the Seddon Turning Basin for assistance with a passenger who required immediate medical assistance. The coxswain made contact with the Tampa fireboat *Patriot*, which took control and provided the assistance needed.

Plans for next year's Gasparilla Invasion are already in the works and are expected to include wider use of the signboards introduced this year and expanded integration of web-based technology for use by radio watchstanders.

Public Education:

The Polk County Detachment will present an About Boating Safety (ABS) class on March 6 at Indian Lake Estates. They will also attempt to recruit new members.

Since the beginning of the year, Flotilla 79 has been a buzz of activity. We started with a staff officer meeting on January 13. Flotilla staff officers set goals for the coming year, identified the tasks and resources needed to meet those goals, and aligned into Logistics, Response and Prevention sections. While this helps align us better with the Coast Guard, it also fosters cooperation and collaboration between

the officers of the various departments.

The flotilla has several new officers, many of whom are learning "hands on" as the calendar and the year's scheduled events unfold. This year, we again plan to present America's Boating Course in Spanish, Paddlesport America, and a personal watercraft operators safety course in addition to our regular Boating Skills and Seamanship program.

According to the flotilla's records, this is the 50th year that Flotilla 79 has provided boating safety courses in Tampa.

Last year, members achieved the flotilla's goal of over 300 Vessel Safety Checks. This year, we are aiming for 400 Vessel Safety Checks.

A new member welcome and orientation meeting was held Saturday, January 22 at Flotilla 79. This was an opportunity for new and prospective members to learn just how much they could do for the Auxiliary, and how membership in the Auxiliary benefited them. We also covered proper uniform wear.

The flotilla has a new DHS compliant web page, and in the Communications Department, Tampa Radio One maintained radio watch for all of the Auxiliary vessels during Gasparilla Invasion. We are still in the process of securing a Maritime Mobile Service Identity (MMSI) number in order to adopt the Digital Selective Calling (DSC) system in the radio room.

The Flotilla 7-16 Program Visitor team hit the ground running in 2011. The team completed 54 visits by the end of January. To get the team off to good start, we ordered materials from the Auxiliary National Supply Center (ANSC). The flotilla's goal this year is to complete 450 visits.

The Vessel Examiner team completed 135 Vessel Safety Checks (VSC) by the time their newsletter was published during the first week of February. 



Get Qualified as an Auxiliary Recreational Boating Safety Program Visitor in Almost One Step!

Newly appointed Staff Officer-Program Visitor (SO-PV 7), Cinda Hitchcock, and Glenn Dobos, former SO-PV 7, have scheduled a two-hour training session for all Division 7 members interested in becoming Program Visitors (PV).

The training is scheduled for Monday, February 28, from

1900-2130, at Flotilla 72, 1300 Beach Drive, S.E., in St. Petersburg. The flotilla is co-located at Coast Guard Sector St. Petersburg's South Moorings, just inside the entry gate and opposite from the Coast Guard Exchange.

There are 30 slots for this class and only a few remain available. To reserve a slot, contact Cinda Hitchcock at: kitdover1122@earthlink.net by Friday, February 25.

The class is designed to prepare attendees to tackle the PV on-line test and for the most part, is a "one-anddone" approach to becoming qualified as a Program Visitor. After completing the two-hour course, attendees are encouraged to take the on-line test immediately and arrange with their flotilla FSO-PV to participate in two actual visits to local marine-related outlets, fulfilling the two-visit requirement to become fully qualified as Program Visitors.

As Auxiliary "ambassadors," Program Visitors establish relationships with managers and employees at marinas, outlets catering to fishing enthusiasts, marine equipment stores, boat dealerships, repair facilities and virtually any marine-related business. Program Visitors provide brochure racks to outlets and maintain them with up-todate state and federal boating safety, marine domain awareness and environmental protection literature, promote boating safety education classes, Vessel Safety Check (VSC) programs, advise of Auxiliary community activities and as appropriate, engage partners in planning special events that promote safe boating.

In Division Seven, program visits are vitally important to "populating" the various boating safety education classes at our flotillas, and create outstanding opportunities to promote flotilla and division efforts to make Tampa Bay a safer place to boat.

Many flotillas have been successful at getting members qualified as both Vessel Examiners (VE) and Program Visitors, which makes Auxiliary outreach efforts much more productive and efficient. Division members not qualified as VEs are encouraged to take the on-line course and arrange with their FSO-VE to participate in five practice VSCs!

Manatees: Florida's Gentle Giants

I admit to being nervous. I was on an imminent collision course with 1,200 pounds of Manatee flesh. It's how they say hello. They glide up to each other and press snouts. "Mama" manatee decided I was worth saying hello to

Reviewing the video of the event shows the gentlest of touches. "Mama's" nose scrunches up to the lens and then glides off without disturbing the camera. They are truly gentle giants.

As "Mom" glided by, seven equally spaced pink gashes from a propeller strike were visible on her side. While leaving behind dramatic scars, propellers

are not the only part of a boat that can cause damage. Unlike human beings, manatees have their lungs situated close to their backs, which keeps them upright in the water. A hard strike by a boat skeg or the hull can cause internal damage, which may not be visible to the eye. Boat collisions accounted for 83 Manatee deaths in Florida in the year 2010.

Having lungs on your back creates another problem; it interferes with a good belly rub. "Mom" had decided we had to earn the privilege of her company; she swam straight at us and rolled over. The message was clear, "You... in the water... make yourself useful..." Never one to miss an opportunity for interspecies interaction, I obliged. And here it gets a little sticky. Those top mounted lungs make it hard for a manatee to stay upside down. So they grab onto things, like your leg or your chest to keep from flipping over. It can be downright embarrassing. Manatees are related to elephants (they have four toenails on each flipper), so their flippers are deceptively strong. They can hold their breath for four minutes, twenty if they are sleeping. Since they are a protected species, you remain "polite". The belly rub ends when "Mom" lets go and comes up for air.

Manatees can swim 15 miles per hour in a short burst. Trying to swim away from one that likes you is impossible. I got smart and maneuvered my dive partner Beverly between the two of us. Tag, you are it! She quickly became the recipient of "Moms" affections. It gave me the opportunity to see what the other Manatees were doing.

Our frolicking had kicked up a silt cloud, so I swam towards clear water and turned around to film the action. I turned into the face of a baby manatee. While manatee eyesight isn't very sharp, sensitive hair clumps called "Vibrissae" are distributed along the surface of their bodies. They use these to feel vibrations in the water around them. "Junior" had followed me through the turbulence and was trying to figure out exactly what I was.

On the video, in between my breathing, you can hear "Junior's" high pitched vocalizations, being answered by his mother. "Mom" glided over to offer moral support. Beverly and I kept our distance. In Citrus county Florida, it is legal to swim with manatees. I had done manatee dives with experienced guides. I felt comfortable enough to have my fifth encounter without supervision. I had reviewed the rules

with Beverly:

- Do not approach within ten feet of a manatee; if they want to interact, they will come to you
- · Never chase a manatee
- Manatees have the right of way; you are the "give way" vessel
- Do not swim over a manatee
- Do not grab a manatee
- Do not ride a manatee
- Stay on the surface, no diving
- · No scuba diving- snorkel only
- Do not touch or approach a sleeping manatee
- Never isolate a baby manatee from its mother

We gave "Mom" and "Junior" a respectful distance and floated without moving. After "Mom" had reassured her baby, she swam over to make proper introductions. I pedaled backwards to get a shot of mom with her offspring. It did not work out quite the way I'd expected. The faster I swam away from them, the faster they swam after me. I tried to zip to the side. They were having none of that. They turned on a dime, hot on my heels. It dawned on me that we were playing chase. We went around in a mad circle, like keystone cops. By then a couple of other young manatees had come over to see what the commotion was about. The manatees started playing with each other: chase, nose rub, grab with flippers, repeat.

I moved clear of the manatee melee, looking for the good shots with my camera. Out of the corner of my eye, I saw "Junior" bounce-walking over to me on his flippers like an astronaut on the moon. He turned and appraised me with one eye. I looked back and saw another sad sight: "Junior" was covered in cold-stress sores.

In 2010, the Florida Wildlife Commission tallied 767 manatee deaths. Almost a third of those deaths were due to cold stress. A manatees' digestive system slows down when exposed to prolonged exposure to cold waters. This has a cascade effect on their health that may include pneumonia, infections, and a compromised immune system. With a steady temperature of 72 degrees, Florida's fresh water springs are an ideal place for manatees to find refuge from the cold during the winter. Other manatees may choose to travel south to warmer waters. Man has provided another option; power plant discharge basins. There is concern about manatees depending on this artificial source of warm water. Where will the manatees go if the power plant closes or is moved?

"Junior" did not seem to be worried about any of this now. After looking me over carefully, he moved away a short distance, and turned around and came right back at me. Much like a playful puppy, he charges and then runs off expecting us to chase him. He did this three or four time before deciding that I was no fun, and swam off to find "Mom".

My camera started to beep its low power warning. A quick glance at my watch indicated that we had been in the water for almost an hour. I signaled to Beverly and we made for the boat. Our new friends followed us for a bit, but turned and left when they saw us leave the water. The gentle giants drifted back into the shallows of the warm lagoon.

Blackthorn Memorial

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. - Coast Guardsmen, survivors, family members, members of the USCG Auxiliary and community members from around the Tampa Bay area commemorated the 31st anniversary of the Coast Guard Cutter Blackthorn tragedy, Friday, January 28, 2011, at Blackthorn Memorial Park, in St. Petersburg.

The Blackthorn sank after colliding with the tanker Capricorn near the Sunshine Skyway Bridge on Jan 28, 1980. Twenty-three of the Blackthorn's 50 crewmembers lost their lives during the Coast Guard's worst peacetime disaster. A memorial inscribed with the names of the crewmembers that perished now stands two miles north of the accident site.

Friday's ceremony consisted of an aerial salute by Coast Guard aircraft, remarks by Coast Guard Rear Adm. William D. Baumgartner, commander Seventh Coast Guard District, posting of the Colors, and reading of the lost crewmembers' names, each commemorated by the placing of a rose beneath the memorial.

The Blackthorn tragedy provided the impetus for the establishment of the Command and Operations School at the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn. The school offers courses to prepare command-level officers and senior enlisted members for command duty afloat. Commanding officers are now required to formally assess risks such as

transiting an unfamiliar port at night and are given full discretion and encouraged to say no if they feel the risks involved are unnecessary.

Additionally, the Coast Guard developed new training requirements, spent more money on safety equipment and made changes to the navigational aids in and around Tampa Bay.

History of the Blackthorn Tragedy

On January 28, 1980, having just completed a 3 month overhaul, the Blackthorn was outward bound from Tampa Bay. Meanwhile the tanker Capricorn was standing into the bay. LCDR George Sepel, the captain of the Blackthorn, was on the bridge, but ENS John Ryan had the conn.

Having been overtaken by the Russian passenger ship Kazakhstan, Blackthorn continued almost in mid-channel. The brightly lit passenger vessel obscured the ability of the crews of Blackthorn and Capricorn to see each other. Capricorn began to turn

left, but this would not allow the ships to pass port-to-port. Unable to make radio contact with the tender, Capricorn's pilot blew two short whistle blasts to have the ships pass starboard-to-starboard. With the officer of the deck confused in regard to the standard operating procedure, Blackthorn's captain issued orders for evasive action.

Though the ships collided, damage did not seem to be extensive. The problem, however, was that Capricorn's anchor was ready for letting go. It became imbedded in the tender's hull and ripped open the port side. Just seconds after the slack in the anchor chain became taut, Blackthorn capsized. Six off-duty personnel who had mustered when they heard the collision alarm were trapped in the dark. Several crew members who had just reported aboard tried to escape and in the process trapped themselves in the engine room. Though 27 crew members survived the collision, 23 perished.

In the end, the primary responsibility for the collision was placed with LCDR Sepel as he had permitted an inexperienced junior officer to conn the ship in an unfamiliar waterway with heavy traffic. The Blackthorn was salvaged for the investigation and was then taken out into the Gulf of Mexico and sunk as an artificial reef. *

To Mix Gold With Silver, Add Fog!

On December 8, 2010, Flotilla 75 members Walt Wagner, Ted Cohen and Paul Moen aboard the Auxiliary facility *Gulf Lady*, worked with four 25' Transportable Port Security Boats (TPSB) of the Coast Guard on a port security training mission in upper Tampa Bay.

Using encrypted radios to communicate, the Coast Guard tried to locate the *Gulf Lady* in pea-soup fog while the Auxiliary vessel gently eluded their predicted or anticipated location included in the original Coast Guard briefing. Coast Guard crewmembers onboard the Auxiliary vessel traded out to give other Guardsmen an opportunity to train on the TPSBs prior to deployment overseas.

The objective of the patrol mission was for the *Gulf Lady* to

play the part of a vessel that the Coast Guard TPSBs were attempting to protect from an intruder. To make the exercise more challenging, the Coast Guard Auxiliary was instructed to make unexpected speed, course and destination changes. To complicate the situation further, the Coast Guard Patrol Commander injected an artificial emergency to



which his boat crews had to respond. The thick fog did the rest. Boatswain Mate Mike Miller of the Coast Guard was in charge of the operation and was pleased with the success of the training mission saying that, "Having the Auxiliary vessel participate made it possible to get much more done."

Coast Guard Auxiliary Authorized to Train Sea Cadets.

WASHINGTON — Coast Guard Auxiliary members are now authorized to provide shore side and underway training to Sea Cadets & Sea Scouts, under a program that is an outgrowth of the Auxiliary Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Naval Sea Cadet Corps (NSCC), and its Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the Boy Scouts of America (BSA).

The type of training to be provided includes standard Auxiliary boat crew and coxswain skill training that is already a part of Sea Cadet and Sea Scout training programs. This includes activities such as preparing the vessel to get underway, docking, operating the vessel, anchoring, and safety drills.

The training will be provided by Auxiliary boat crew, selected for their ability to mentor boat crew and coxswain trainees, many having prior experience working with youth or younger trainees through the Coast Guard Auxiliary or other youth-serving organizations. Sea Scouts and Sea Cadets will be provided with the same personal protective equipment as Auxiliarists, including appropriate life jackets.

American Canoe Association Signs MOA With Auxiliary.

ST. LOUIS - The American Canoe Association (ACA) and the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary announced signing of a Memorandum of Agreement to promote safety among those who use kayaks, canoes and other paddlecraft. The new agreement establishes co-

operative efforts broadening outreach and education to the paddle sports community.

Paddlesports boating is one of the fastest growing recreation activities in the United States. In 2008 the Outdoor Industry Association reported that approximately 17.8 million people participated in paddlesports getting out on the water nearly 50,000 times daily. The explosive growth has triggered a disturbing increase in paddlesports injuries and fatalities. Often, with little investment inexperienced individuals are on the water without adequate paddle sport safety equipment or training.

The American Canoe Association and the Coast Guard Auxiliary are committed to reversing this trend. With input from the ACA a new Auxiliary Paddlesports America Course is now available nationwide complementing traditional safety courses that have been offered by ACA for decades. This classroom based training provides paddlers basic knowledge needed to safely operate their vessels including: knowing the paddlecraft, trip planning, safe operation, legal requirements, and paddling emergencies. The American Canoe Association and the Coast Guard Auxiliary will also reach out to paddlers through the paddlecraft vessel safety check program. Experts will talk with paddlers as they examine safety gear and provide personalized paddlesports safety guidance.

"With this cooperative effort we will reach out to the growing population of paddlers providing needed training to keep them safe on the water", said Jim Vass, Auxiliary National Commodore.

The Intercom is always looking for articles about Auxiliarists, stories of interest, and photographs. If this sounds confusing, just send the image straight from your camera and add a description that includes who and what is depicted in the photograph, and the name of the person who took the photograph.

Take a camera with you everywhere! Vessel examinations, member training, patrols, Public Education programs and fellowship events are all great photo opportunities. Be proud of everything that you do, and brag a little bit about each other! It is a wonderful way to express appreciation for a member's efforts.
