

Conducted a class for those who teach the basic boating safety class "Boat America" The workshop was primarily attended by members of the Coast Guard Auxiliary from Division 1but was open to those originations that hold safe boating classes. The purpose of the workshop was to provide an update to educators on new and upcoming changes to the states requirements for students to qualify for the certificate and card that recognize them as legally permitted to operate a boat of 10 HP or greater. Full requirement (anyone born on or after January 1, 1988 is required to either have successfully completed a National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA) approved boating education course or have passed an equivalent course or temporary certificate examination.)

The workshop was held January 20th at Coast Guard station Destin. Just a few of the changes coming include, new slides for the Florida specific section of the class and new questions for the Florida section as well.



"We are growing this in a few ways, none that are new to the Aux.


- Word of mouth, from members along with VE's and talking it up.
