Dependability in the Auxiliary. Understanding The Mission. By Rob Kumpf, AUXPA2 National Director of Training

The Coast Guard Auxiliary is a uniformed volunteer component of the U.S. Coast Guard, a federal military branch that serves under the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. We all know this, but how many of us have spent time reflecting on what that really means? Yes, we are volunteers, and do not receive payment for the duties we perform, but this does not mean we should drop our responsibilities when things become challenging.

Being a "volunteer" in the Coast Guard Auxiliary means something slightly different than being a "volunteer" in other organizations where the stakes might not be as high. A "volunteer" in the Auxiliary means that we are given the choice of what missions we wish to perform, what roles we seek, and the time we put into those missions and roles. The "I'm just a volunteer" mentality is lethal to the reputation of the Auxiliary as a force multiplier that our active and reserve shipmates can depend upon as their mission continues to expand.

Once we accept a mission or commit to a role, we have left the normal realm of being a "volunteer," and we have entered a realm where we need to fulfill the requirements of our role or the mission. I am not suggesting we not set limits a healthy balance is essential, an Auxiliarist should never put their health, family, or paying job at risk to fulfill their obligation to the Auxiliary, but I am suggesting that once we commit, we do the work required. Some of this work we do can be arduous, possibly tedious, but once we say we will do it, we have to follow through so as not to let our members and our service down. The consequences of being undependable can be vast and lasting for the individual, and the entire Coast Guard Auxiliary. Let's face it, administrative tasks are not the thing that Hollywood makes movies about, nor are they the things recruiters highlight to prospective recruits. There are not thousands upon thousands of people attempting to join paying organizations to do paperwork, much fewer organizations where those tasks are done without pay.

Yet, our organization comes to a screeching halt without the less exciting or seemingly tedious tasks being attended to and completed with care. Now, do not get me wrong, I would love to spend most of my time in the Auxiliary flying high above the surface on SAR missions or ice patrols, aboard a cutter smashing through ice or dropping ATONs, or traveling to faraway locales such as Alaska, Hawaii, or Guam to teach a course, but this is not what the mission calls on me to do. The mission calls for me to sit in more Zoom meetings or phone conferences than I thought humanly possible; the mission calls for me to spend time writing briefing memos and reports or responding to more emails than I can count. While not always exciting, these things make it possible for the Auxiliary to conduct its other missions.

Our training programs would not survive without the paperwork and the less exciting tasks, and I volunteered to take on the mission. Each of us volunteered to join the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary the world's premier volunteer life-saving organization— and we are rightly proud to wear the uniform and do what we can when we can. **We need to be dependable; we must strive to improve our skills.** Not all daring rescues and excitement commitment and dependability, no matter what the task, make us the group our nation's Coast Guard turns to when they need critical gaps filled.

Their need for us continues to grow, and in new ways, are we prepared and willing to take on the roles they need us to take? Will we abandon them when some of the duties are less exciting than what we wish we were doing? Let's re-commit to putting the mission before our desires and serving the Coast Guard family in whatever ways we can. I firmly believe that through good training, dependability, and commitment, a great many new and exciting ways of serving the Coast Guard will become available to the Coast Guard Auxiliary. #### Auxiliarists Answer "The Call to Mission"!

27 AUGUST - 04 SEPTEMBER 2017: A Category 4, Hurricane HARVEY, struck the East Texas coast. Hardest hit was Houston. One-third of the city was completely flooded. Nearly 135,000 homes were damaged or destroyed. 7 of our members at the time were mobilized in support of the operation - 4 of whom are still current members: Roberto Ortiz-Diaz and JeanneMarie McNamara for watchstanding and air operations while Bob Puharic and Alex Shapovalov were involved with transporting vehicles in a convoy that involved our members and members from 7-5 (Austin).

#### **Coast Guard On Mission in Georgia**

28 SEPTEMBER 2023 CHARLESTON, S.C. — A Coast Guard Air Station Savannah aircrew rescued two men, Thursday, after their 34-foot fishing vessel sank 50 miles offshore Savannah, Georgia.

CG Sector Charleston watchstanders received a report from CG District 7 of an emergency position indicating radio beacon activation from a fishing vessel 50 miles offshore Savannah. District 7 contacted the vessel's registered owner who stated the vessel was offshore fishing with approximately two people aboard. Charleston issued an urgent marine information broadcast and attempted to contact the vessel with no results. An Air Station Savannah helicopter crew diverted to the vessel's position provided by the EPIRB.

The responding aircrew arrived on scene, commenced searching and located two people in a

life raft after they launched a flare to alert the aircrew of their position. The aircrew hoisted the men and transported them to Hunter Army Airfield. No medical concerns were reported.

"The mariners demonstrated remarkable skill in deploying their lifesaving equipment, enabling our crew to locate them within minutes upon arriving on scene," said Lt. Cmdr. Sarah Anderson, aircraft commander during the case. "The mariner's effective use of their EPIRB and signaling flare played a pivotal role in the success of this case."



"This case demonstrates the importance of having layers of communications effectively taking the "search" out of search and rescue," said Scott Szczepaniak, recreational boating safety specialist, Coast Guard Seventh District. "Anyone venturing offshore, including recreational boaters, should consider carrying an EPIRB, and a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB), as an extra layer of security. A properly registered VHF-FM marine radio, equipped with digital selective calling and programmed with the vessel's MMSI and connected to a GPS, should be your first layer of security. Cell phone coverage can be spotty or non-existent and phones are not built for the rigors of the marine environment and should not be your only means of communication offshore." ## Auxiliary Member Receives The Presidential Lifetime Volunteer Award!

At the January District 11 North Division 5, Suisun Bay meeting, 2023 Commander Robert Bain, and past Division Commander Thomas Sarnicola presented Glenn Hunter with the United States Presidential Lifetime Volunteer Award in recognition of Hunter's twenty-two years of service to the US Coast Guard auxiliary having contributed approximately 7,000 hours of service. Hunter received a gold medal, a letter from President Joseph Biden, and a certificate of appreciation signed by former President Donald Trump.

Glenn often speaks about the pride he has for his father, Glennwood, who served in the US Army during World War 2 and received the Bronze Star before being discharged as First Sergeant. In that same spirit, Glenn joined the Auxiliary after the terrorist attack on New York on September 1, 2001. Glenn has obtained numerous Auxiliary qualifications, served as Flotilla Commander for two separate units, and currently serves at USCG Station Vallejo as Auxiliary Unit Coordinator. In 2022, Glenn coordinated a successful Boat Crew Academy which graduated five new crew members.

The Presidential Lifetime Volunteer Award was created by President George W. Bush in 2003 to recognize the valuable contributions volunteers make to the nation. The President's Council on Service and Civic Participation was chaired by Senators Robert Dole and John Glenn. Its purpose is to recognize leaders from all walks of life and to highlight the best of the American spirit of those who improve their communities through volunteer service. Of those drowning victims with reported life jacket usage, 85% were not wearing a life jacket. Where instruction was known, 74% of deaths occurred on boats where the operator did not receive boating safety instruction. Only 14% percent of deaths occurred on vessels where the operator had received a nationally-approved boating safety education certificate.
