BANK ACCOUNTS

Per Section N of the Auxiliary Manual, all Auxiliary unit funds shall be promptly deposited to accounts containing the appropriate unit designation and the words "U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary". An Auxiliary unit's standing rules establish the requirements for a unit bank account. A unit may have multiple accounts - checking, savings and/or certificates of deposit.



To open a bank account for the unit or to update the signature cards on the account due to a change in the unit elected officers or the unit finance officer, the finance officer will need to have the following items ready for bank personnel:

A copy of the unit meeting minutes that reflect the election of the new unit leadership and their full titles. The minutes should be signed and dated by the unit Secretary.

A copy of the unit leader's memorandum that appoints the unit finance officer.

A copy of the officer's report from Auxdata II that provides full name, title, address, and telephone number on the new bank signature cards.

The E.I.N. (Employer Identification Number provided by I.R.S.) This is provided in Section N of the Auxiliary Manual and on page 4 of the Auxiliary Financial Controls Standard Operating Procedure.

Copies of IRS letters showing the E.I.N. and the tax-exempt status of the Auxiliary. These letters are found in Appendix A and Appendix B of the Auxiliary Financial Controls Standard Operating Procedure.

Flotilla monthly bank statements shall be reviewed by the Flotilla Commander and the Flotilla Finance officer to verify that all transactions are in order. District and division bank statements shall be reviewed by Division Commander and Finance Officer and District Commander and Staff Officer on a quarterly basis.

Finally, all units shall use only a federally-insured (FDIC or NCUA) bank or credit union that provides original or image copies of all cancelled checks.

Be sure to get your uniform inspected before 31 December 2024. If you don't, you will be in REYR for any/all of your qualifications. Come to a division meeting (they are the first Saturdays beginning in August and then every other month) and there will be someone who is qualified to do the inspection.

Maybe someone in your own flotilla has had their uniform inspected and passed. If so, they can do an inspection for you. Either way, it is necessary to get this done. We all know what a pain it is to get out of REYR so don't get into REYR in the first place!

The other issue is that I am not seeing hours from all flotillas. A meeting gives you 7029 hours (that' form 7029 which is general rather than specific hours). Anyone can send in hours; it doesn't have to be the IS officer. You can also enter then yourself. Whichever way you do it, just be sure to get the hours sent in.

When the Flotilla 34 does their VE Stations every year, we always go to North Shore and Port Charles. In each location, a Public Affairs table is set up with all the current boating information. As each Vessel Examiner greets the next boat to be inspected, the Captain is handed a packet of Safe Boating information.

Next on the schedule is the annual Kayaking at Dorst Lake in Maryville, IL. This year it was held in June. Larry Miller and I set up our display table with lots of information about kayaks and, of course, all our regular safe boating brochures. We chitchat, answer question, hand out a few brochures, have lunch and meander around to watch the activities.



From noon till 4pm, volunteers assist members of the public that would like to learn about kayaking. Dorst Lake is perfect because it's a small meandering lake easy to navigate. Every hour a new group arrives to get a short talk about being on the lake. Everyone gets a life jacket to put on. They find a kayak, get in with some help and pushed into the lake.

After 45 minutes, a horn blows to let everyone know it's time to come back to shore. Greeting them are free hot dogs, chips and a welcoming water.

At the end of the day, about 250 Maryville residents have had a ride on the lake thanks to all the volunteers assisting them from the Parks and Rec, Kayaking Clubs and us, the Coast Guard Auxiliary.

Provide continuous support and opportunities for skill development to keep members engaged and motivated.

Part of Lake Ontario Is Now the Country's 16th Marine Sanctuary

The federal government is looking to celebrate and preserve a corner of America's Great Lakes, designating a 1,722-square-mile stretch of eastern Lake Ontario as a marine sanctuary. The New York sanctuary will be the 16th in the country and third in the Great Lakes, per the <u>National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration</u>.

"It means a lot for the recognition of this place," Ellen Brody, Great Lakes regional coordinator of the NOAA's Office of National Marine Sanctuaries, told WXXI News. "It will become a place that people Continued on 10

Continued from 9 want to visit. It will have tourism impacts; it will have economic development impacts."

In addition to boosting research and tourism in the area, the sanctuary designation furthers the nation's goal of protecting, conserving, or restoring at least 30% of U.S. lands and waters by 2030. It also provides an opportunity for people to learn more about the history of Lake Ontario as a trade and transportation route, which ties in to 41 known shipwrecks (and 19 suspected others) located in the sanctuary.
