I was contacted by DCDR Don Anderson to fly with Civil Air Patrol as an AUXAIR asset was not available. I was then contacted by Pete Hnat who is both a AUX and CAP member. I was instructed where and when to pick up the CAP crew and transport to Station Rio Vista. I met Pilot Mike Prusak and Aircrew Rex DeMartini at Rio Vista airport and were transported to Station Rio Vista for the mission briefing. During the briefing were notified of two "target" boats which were twenty-sixes operated by Gold Side CG. Aux had a total of five surface assets including 4 boats and one PWC. After a briefing Mike, Rex and I went back to Rio Vista Airport and departed after doing CRM, GAR score review and aircraft safety briefing. Also discussed was the similarities and differences between AUX and CAP including insignia, training, responsibilities, and equipment.

We located the first twenty-six within 5 minutes of arriving within the search area. Pictures were taken and a location report made. The second "target" boat took a bit longer as it was tucked away but that target was located.

Pictures were taken of the surface assets and Gold Side "targets." A report was given.


3 ups:

- 1) The orange "A" on top really made a difference when trying to pick out AUX vs. NONAUX boats
- 2) The signal mirrors, when used properly were absolutely the best in trying to locate boats
- 3) Comms and com co-ordination worked well

3 downs:

- 1) Lots of assets communicating at or about the same time which made it a bit congested at times
- 2) Not all assets had the "A"
- 3) The asset pictures did not always show the vessel the way it would look on patrol IE: picture did not show a Bimini or Bimini color but underway, the Bimini was up and no "A" shown. This added a few minutes to the identification process.

SAREX CGSTA Rio Vista. What an adventure. Personnel from Aux Divisions 3 and 5, Aux Air, and the Civil Air Patrol joined forces on shore, aloft and afloat to conduct our first ever Search and Rescue Exercise (SAREX) on the Sacramento and San Joaquin Rivers. Our host was BMC Mike Bennett, the Station's OIC and his able crew of Coasties who staff this vital River Station. AND..we were all fed due to the marvelous efforts of our AUX-FS experts-BRAVO ZULUS TO ALL WHO WERE THERE.




















MODEL PATIENT


























SEMPER PARATUS
